Hi John:

Well, we are over 2 weeks into the war and all is going well. Our jets are flying great and they are all coming home safely. After their missions, we are still working 12 hour shifts, 7 days a week. But hope things will slow down soon so we can get a day off. I've been here over a month and a half and have had 2 days off. Both days I spent down at the Bureau of Frequency and Wireless licensing. Getting a license here is not such an easy task. First you must belong to the local Radio Club, before the bureau will run your application.



Sounds funny doesn't it. First you need to find an application for the Club--Ha. A92BE helped me there. After you fill out the club application, it goes to the Bureau for a security check. After the security check, it goes back to the club and the club board votes on it. After approval, the club gives the Bureau the approved club application, then the Bureau runs your license approval though yet another security check! After all this and about 2 months you might have your license!! Ha. I was told by A92FL that Lloyd and Iris Colvin when they were here had their license in several days. Wonder if they could help me?? Since I am on military orders and have a military ID, I don't need a VISA. The Bureau here has never done a security check without a VISA. Mine is a first with military papers and military ID. Hope this doesn't slow things up! Ha.

So far, my club application is in the Bureau for the security check. Maybe in a couple more weeks I'll have my license--the station is basically set up and ready to go!! It is my TS-930S, Clipperton-L, Keyer, Shure 444, A-D 4BTV. Propagation to West Coast sounds great from here. Long path on 40 (your morning) is super. W6YA is super loud along with KC7V, AA6XX, W6PU. Others heard have been W6REC, W0ZV. I have also heard 80 meters state-side on my long wire that goes around the tent!! Ha.

Legal power here is 400 watts, so the Clipperton-L should do just fine! Ha. YA0RR was super loud on all bands here also! Seems like

the best times for stateside west coast propagation here is sunrise-sunset. 40 & 20 being the best. 10 meters also has had some great openings to West Coast, but mostly East Coast sigs.

Well, I better get back to work. Thanks again for the letter and support. Again if anyone in the club can help expedite the license process, please let me know. AA7EN on packet is my point of contact. I talk to him weekly. Looks like May 15 is our date to leave or sooner. I hope sooner.

# HISTORY OF NCCC

## WRITTEN BY ITS FOUNDERS

Introduction: We have asked Jim Neiger, to lead off this series with his recollections of why and how the NCCC got started. Most readers know that Jim Neiger, N6TJ, ZD8Z, etc., etc., etc., is one of the world's pre-eminent contest operators and has been so for the last quarter century. Some of you, however, may not realize that NCCC was his idea and that he was one of the founders.

He wrote the following while on a flight from Antigua to ZD8-land. Here it is. Enjoy.

### HOW NCCC BEGAN

#### Chapter One by Jim Neiger, N6TJ

The concept of a contest-oriented club in the SF Bay Area was "kicked around" by myself and Rick - "The Locust" - Hilding, K6VVA around the 1965 - 1968 period. Rick and I were very active in the DX contests, as members of the Northern California DX Club, and could often be found, slugging it out, man y mano from K6ERV, K6OHJ, K6DXM, WA6GFY, or any other stations crazy enough to host us. Guess Rick and I were among the early "hired guns".

Rick acquired his nickname ("The Locust") during these operations, not necessarily for his prowess on the DX bands which was considerable (I still consider him to be the FINEST DX operator, Phone or CW, EVER, and

certainly of his generation), but rather for his in-contest reputation for cleaning out the host's refrigerator!

Anyway, back to the point: We were frustrated that the members of the NCDXC did not share our interests in launching major club efforts in the contests. The NCDXC - SCDXC rivalry in the ARRL DX contests was HUGE during the 1960s and although the NCDXC members liked the sweet smell of victory when the winner was announced at Fresno (it would be many years yet before Visalia was to be discovered), Rick and I felt that we, and a few others like W6CUF (now W6CF), W6WX, K6ERV, K6AHV (now W6RJ), K6OHJ, W6WB, were "carrying" the NCDXC.....and that this club really wasn't interested in contesting per se.

When I moved to ZD8 in April 1968, the notion of a "NCCC" was put on the back burner, but K6VVA and ZD8Z kept the idea alive during our frequent 20 meter skeds.

In July 1970, I finished a one year operation as 9Y4AA, and moved back to the Bay Area. Little did I realize that the August 1970 meeting of the NCDXC would become the final stimulus to the creation of the Northern California Contest Club.

I'm sure that many of those in attendance that fateful night will recall the turbulence of the business portion of the meeting. K6VVA wanted the NCDXC to

officially support Sweepstakes participation and entries (Rick liked to collect wallpaper, and certificates were only awarded to club winners if the club had at least three entries).

Someone exclaimed that NCDXC was a DX club and had no business sanctioning contests other than DX contests. I had the notion that the NCDXC could satisfy both the DXers and contest - minded, as had been successfully achieved for so many years by the Frankford and Potomac Valley Radio Clubs.

When my motion to accomplish same was soundly defeated, Rick and I ordered another 807 (what else was there to do??). When this frosty 807 arrived, I wrote on the cocktail napkin...."NCCC"! And the rest, as they say, is history. As I recall, others at our table who ordered 807s were W6CUF and K6EBB.

Within a couple of weeks, the Charter Meeting of NCCC was held in my town house in Santa Clara. Among those in attendance were W6BHY (N6TJ), WA6DKF (N6RO), W6RGG (N6KB), W6CUF (W6CF), K6EBB, K6CQF (K6PU), K6AUC, WA6UFW (K6RV), W6WX (silent key), and K6ERV (silent key).

Because it was my home, I was elected the first NCCC president. I think K6EBB was Vice - President, but I'm sure someone else has a better recollection of this than I do. W6CUF was the first editor of the JUG.



Immediately, of course, came conflict of loyalties.....the NCDXC and the NCCC. However, having done the damage, I beat a hasty strategic retreat from the area in July 1971 and let the battle wage.

It is hard to believe that 20 years have passed since the founding of the NCCC. I've kept my membership current, if not always as an active member. I guess, in retrospect, that the many accomplishments of the NCCC more than attest to the notion that Rick Hilding and I had a pretty good idea.

Ed's note. Jim has given us a great recollection of how he and Rick started the club. How 'bout the others of you who were part of that founding team, or one of the very early members, doing the same. Write us a few paragraphs about your memories of the beginning of NCCC. We'd all enjoy reading your recollections too. K6PU and K6AUC, how 'bout you next? You were there. What happened from your viewpoint? We want now to publish stories of the very early days. Later days will be requested after that.

# 1990 CALIFORNIA QSO PARTY

## FUN!

"..Of all the contests, this is the best!" WA9MRU

"..I really enjoy this contest, and it's the only one I enter." NSCOP

THE season opener. The annual kick-off for the radio contest season: THE CALIFORNIA QSO PARTY. A chance to test those new antennas, push that amp, see if the computer works as a dummy load and crashes. It's also a chance to see old friends, maybe for the first time since an early summer contest qso. You will hear plenty of new, hesitant ops trying out radio contesting for the first time ever. "Enjoyable! My first real contest....I'm glad I picked this one to start" (KA3WSZ, 14 YEARS OLD).

## Who won? Everybody won!

A record 414 log packages descended on Contest Headquarters in California (up 8% over '89); 153 from California (down 10 logs from '89) and 261 from outside the Golden State (up 45 logs from '89). We received entries from 48 states, 5 Canadian provinces, 16 DXCC countries, and 53 of California's 58 counties. Thirty one new, single-op records were racked up by the contest gang. Twenty four mobiles and county expeditions (CE) activated several dozen of those rare and hard-to-get counties.

People have fun in this contest: "What a pity that CA QSO Party is being held only once a year!" (LY2BRP, op at LY1BZB). "This was my first experience with the CQP..it ranks up with the best" (AA0AW). "This is an outstanding contest and all persons contacted in CA were very good sports and were very courteous." (K8OSF). "I work a bunch of the state QSO parties and none of the others are even close!" (NS0VV). "Thanks for having the CQP. I had fun. Its beats a lot of DX contests!" (K9JS). "Had a ball! Most fun in a long time." (W8AKS/6).

## THE RESULTS: CALIFORNIA

### SINGLE OPs

Last year's second place finisher, Jim N6IG, again operated from W6GO; however this year he smashed all opposition to take first

place honors. He collected 354.5k points to break the old Sacramento county record (set by him from W6GO in 1989). Operating from his cattle ranch in Modoc county, Duane W6REC, bettered his 1989 fifth place finish by scoring 284k points and snagging second spot. He broke the old '88 Modoc record by almost 20k points. Mike KA6SAR, pushed station N6VR into third position with a 279k effort from Ventura county. This bettered his '89 seventh place finish from the same station.

LOW POWER "Life is too short for QRP" (N6TU)  
"Next year, I'll use an amp!" (N6TV)

The low power trophy this year goes to Bob N6TV, who scored 196.5k points and just missed the standing record by 1,200 points (W6AB '89). In San Diego, Charles W6UQF, came in a close second to Bob at 192k points. Operating from W6AB, Bruce N6GC (current record holder), snagged a third place showing. These crafty low power ops all finished in the top twenty at 10th, 11th, and 14th respectively. GOOD SHOW!

Congratulations to the following ops who set new CA county records: W6REC, W6FSJ, NC6U, W6GO (N6IG, op), WA6FGV, K6HIH, WA6ZBX, and W6BSY. FB JOB!!

### THE CALIFORNIA MULTI-OPS

There were plenty of multi-single efforts this year when you consider some operate from "home" while others chose the field day type experience of a county expedition. The expedition type operations generated the big scores in this class. KS6H (+N6ZB) tallied 265.7k points to run away with the multi op county expedition prize. In second place was NI6W (+N7CW, K9VV) with 255.7k points from Imperial county. The K6TMB (+W6SZN, W6OAT, KSXI) high rollers came in third place with 225k points from Placer county (adjacent Stateline, Nevada).

Those multi-singles not in the county expedition class (CE) were led to the finish line by WA6PZL (+N6ENU) with 179.8k points



operating from Ventura county. Taking second place from Santa Clara county was KJ6FD (+KB6NLO) scoring 177.5k and in third was AA6MV (+N6ULI) from Santa Cruz.

### THE RESULTS: OUT-OF-STATE

"The Black Hole strikes agn! The 10 meter pipeline from WIS to CA is awesome." (NOBSH/9)

The Black Hole (Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Minnesota) did hit again. Hard. This is the part of the country that seems to be a tough QTH for most contests, but ops in the Black Hole do well in the CQP. Mike, NOBSH/9, operating from Wisconsin, blasted last year's record-setting performance by KB9S and scored the highest score ever recorded outside California (160k). For the second year in a row, K4XS captured second place; this time with station owner Bill at the helm. And in a photo finish for third place, transplanted sharp-shooter Gary, VE7NTT (aka WA6VEF) edged out fourth place finisher Gerard, KE9I by 23 QSOs. A peek at Gary's log will underscore the difficulties one faces from a QTH so close to California. He had only 43 QSOs on 10 meters (KE9I had 640)!! Gary was forced to make at least 158 band changes during the weekend and was also overheard making QSOs on the YLRL nets, QRU nets, and the Geritol nets.

LOW POWER: "Life is still too short for QRP" (N6TU).

Once again this year, the Black Hole (Minnesota chapter) produced the top low power station from outside California. KFOT, Tom, pushed his 100 watter in for 67k points, and placed 13th overall. Close behind in low power second place (and #16 in the USA) was Bob WA1FCN, with 61.3k points. A fine accomplishment from New England. Congratulations to the following stations from outside CA who set new records in their state/province: KK4TE, WASSOG, WA1FCN, NX3A, K4XS, KE9I, WBOYJT, KM4FO, NB1B, N5OVV, KOPP/7, KD0EE, K4LTA, K6XO/7, K7QQ, KC8FS, NOBSH/9, VE4VV, and VE7NTT. FB!!

"Nice Contest" (IK4GNH)

Overseas activity was hot and heavy for this contest. Thirty-three "DX" stations submitted logs this year compared to twenty-seven in 1989. If you operated from California, you probably remember having a DL, LY or a wiley 4U1 climb over your pile-up of W9s and WBSs. K4XS said, "Got beat to CA by Italians and Spaniards in 1st hour of contest!". Tree, N6TR, operating 4U1ITU,

edged out Gintas LY2BKW, operating from LY2WW. The margin was about 100 QSOs and Tree set a new European record for the CQP, while finishing in the top twenty! These two were everywhere on the bands. At the finish line Gintas said, "Well done Tree, the wine is on me". Third place in Europe went to another of the five LY contesters who sent in logs. Saulius, LYR1751 operated from LY2ZO and racked up 28.2k points. In Asia, the old record of 5k points was shattered by JH7WKQ with a fb score of 20.5k (173x47). Tatsuya's fine effort has given the Asian ops a tough target to shoot at in the future. Second place went to JP1BJR followed by JH1UUT in third spot. A new N.American DX record of 8.5k points was established by Isaac, NP4P. Our African entry was Tom at 5H3TW who managed to snag a few CA stations with his 100 watts and a whip ten feet off the ground. LU6EF, Raul had a fine effort from South America.

### Novice/Technician (N/T) RESULTS

Sixteen novice/technician entries were received and once again KB6HWZ Greg, set a new N/T record from Shasta county. His 50.9k score upped the old 47.3k California N/T mark. In second place was Tim, N6WIN with 29.8k. Outside California Bob, N9ICH repeated his feat from last year and took top N/T honors again. His 18.3k score was followed by the 14.1k posting of KA1SSU, Ray. The 14 year old from Maine also took top spot in his state! Congrats to Greg, Tim, Bob and Ray.

### COUNTY EXPEDITIONS (single op)

Some operators venture out-of-town to do county expeditions and set up their stations, antennas, generators, etc., from scratch. These brave souls withstand many hardships: cold wx, cold food, cold feet, cold dice-tables.

Once again Larry K6AAW, showed us all how to do a county expedition. Operating from the Siskiyou/Trinity county line, his 123k points snagged a first place finish for the 2nd year in a row in this class. Coming in second was John N6JM, from Sierra county; and placing third was our only Mariposa entry Herschel, AA6QY. Other ops braving the elements who deserve our thanks: W6TVP on the Trinity/Shasta county line; N6OM with his 100 watts and a vertical from Butte county; N6AU handing out Alpine, Mono and Toulumne counties; WA6FIT also dished out several hundred QSOs from Toulumne and Inyo; in Kern we had N6LL; WA6BIL pushed San Bernadino county; and WA6OZZ put on Modoc. Congrats and thanks to these brave expeditioners..

MOBILE SIX "Sure is fun to turn a business trip into a drive thru CA countryside and activate some counties!" (WM2C/M6)



Whether marine mobile or auto mobile, the ops in their vehicles provide many QSOs from often rare counties. WJ6Q/M racked up 500+ QSOs from Tehama and Shasta counties to snag the Most-QSOs-BY-A-CA-Mobile award. The boys at K6MO/MM (+N6KG) provided 400 QSOs and four counties from the "4 corners" area in San Francisco Bay. Ken, WM2C/M6 handed out seven counties as he motored across the State on holiday. Another marine mobile was N6IFW/MM from San Joaquin county and N6GKY/M handed out a few from Contra Costa. THANKS TO ALL!

SWEEPS

This year eight single-op stations managed a sweep of all 58 CA counties: K4XS, K9ZO, KE9I, NB1B, N50VV, KVOI, NOBSH/9, VE7NTT. In twenty-five years of the CQP, this has only been achieved by 17 stations.

This is a tough accomplishment, and these stations are to be congratulated. WOW! FB!

In California, only six single-op stations were able to snag all 58 states and provinces: N6TIB, W6REC, W6GO, K6XT, W6AB, N6VR. In 1989, over twenty-seven ops claimed a sweep. The elusive VEB was the multiplier missed by most of those not managing a sweep.

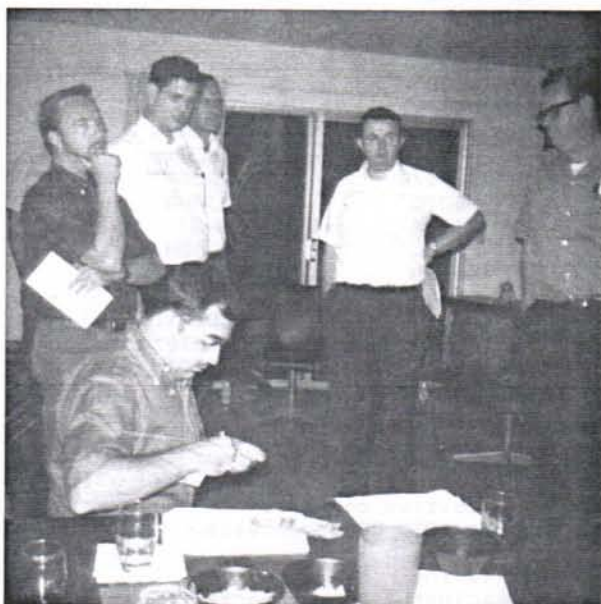
Next time Tree says hi, come back with "HI LARRY." That ought to throw his computer program into a loop.

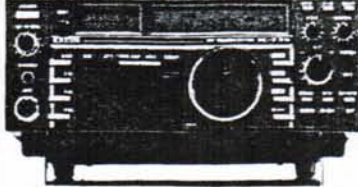
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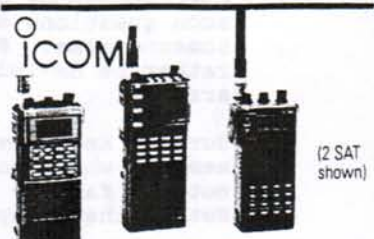


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
