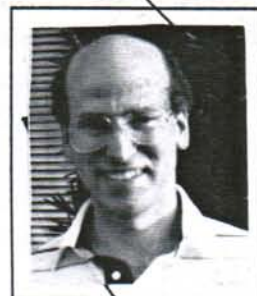

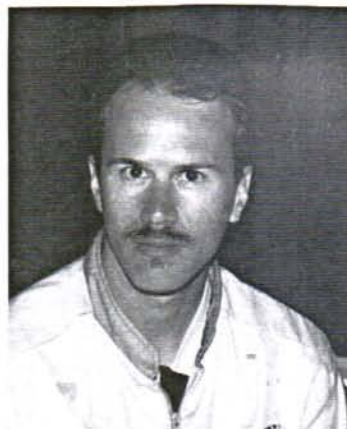
## NEW MEMBERS WHO'S WHO

The ARRL will be pulling in the \$\$\$ for those coffee mugs. I think it is safe to say that (as predicted in the October JUG) activity in SS '93 was at record level, nationally. In the insightful words of W6QHS, after the CW weekend, "Congratulations to all; great contest alive again!"

## How'd we do?

Well, we have a small problem. As of today, 1 December, I only have scores from 65 of us. I know darned well we had over 90 participants, because I worked you. We both know you were active and KB'd, but the ARRL doesn't! Unfortunately, they are the ones that count. Time remains (deadline is 23 December), but do not procrastinate. We have an excellent shot at first place, *but only if you submit your logs and summary sheets.*

OK, enough preaching. Here's where we stand on 30 November: NCCC has 7.1 Meg toward our 10 Meg goal. With the estimated 2.5 million points contained in the 25 logs that will be submitted in the next days, our score will stand close to our 10 Million point goal. I think we will take first place; but don't celebrate yet, those points do not count unless officially submitted (see preaching, above). If you don't see your score, that means I didn't receive it, send it again.

## CQWW

Believe it or not, other contests occurred since the last JUG. Principal others included CQWW phone and CW. NCCC is entering the club competition for CQWW, so be sure to send me your summary sheets. The NCCC club entry for the phone weekend shows almost 19.5 million points. CQWW CW scores will appear in the January, 1993 JUG. Log deadline for CQWW Phone has passed, but CQWW CW log postmark deadline is 15 January, 1993.

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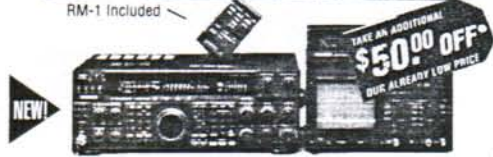
