California QSO Party (CQP)

As I write this, we are less than 2 weeks away from CQP -- our big event this month. CQP can serve as your primary preparation for Sweepstakes, and a great way to kick off the entire Fall contest season. In the CQP Single Op category, you will very likely be "running" (i.e. calling "CQ") a lot, and operating for 24 hours, just like SS. It takes a commitment and physical preparation to operate for 24 hours, unlike some of the recent shorter contests, like NAQP and NA SPRINT. These contests, however, were good practice opportunities for improving our operating skills, and gave us a chance to test and optimize our stations for all the big contests coming this Fall.

CQP Chair Rick, N6RNO and County Coordinator Bob, N6TV have worked hard to make sure that CQP is another successful event for 2008.

Summary

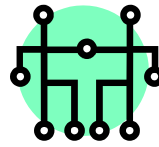
Please try to get on the air for CQP, and use that weekend for station improvements and operating practice. Share your lessons learned in CQP, at the Oct 13 meeting.

SS Preliminary Plan

CW Skimmer Presentation and Live Demo

N6WG Steps in to Lead us in Sweepstakes 2008

By now, I think everyone knows that Fred, K6DGW, had to step back from this job to deal with some serious health challenges. He's done with one hurdle, but there are more to come.

Although not fully rested from his stint as club President, Bob has stepped into the

breach and will lead us in what I believe is a going to be a real battle for the gavel.

Sweepstakes Strategy

Our strategy to defend the gavel has many parts, but they're all based on two fundamental principles:

1. Maximizing butts in chairs for as many hours as possible, and
2. Maximizing the value of each individual effort!

Each one of us can contribute. We can win, but only if each of us does contribute to the best of our abilities.

Let's look at all the ways a member can contribute. Each of us should think about how we can fit into one or more of these slots.

Super Station, Strong Operator

If you've got a great station and can run SO2R, perhaps you can contribute the most by staying home and running it all by yourself. But if you don't want to put in full time, please think about training a guest operator to sit in your chair to fill up your log and add some mults!

Split Site Operation (One form of HMO)

Do you have more than one transceiver? If your station is anything less than killer, you may be able to make the greatest contribution by operating from another QTH for half the contest.

Got a great tribander but not-so-great antennas for 80/40? Try to operate Saturday using a club call from a QTH with good antennas for 80 and 40, then, operate at home on Sunday with your home call.

Have great 80/40 wires but no aluminum? Reverse the schedule, operating at home on Saturday, somewhere else on Sunday.

Only Want to Put In a Few Hours?

Decide when you want to operate, then, train a guest operator on your station, sit with him for a while to make sure he's on the right track, then turn him loose to fill up the log. Use one of the October contests to let

him/her get familiar with your station. Maybe you'll also get help with antennas, computers, logging, etc. Let your Regional Coordinator know that you're looking for a guest operator.

No Station to Operate?

Is your station weak or non-existent? Sign up to be a guest operator. Contact Bob, N6WG, or your local Regional Coordinator and let them know you've got a butt that needs a chair! Do that NOW, so that you can meet your host, get to know his station, spend some time there during a contest, maybe even help with antennas or other setup issues.

Station Sharing

The key to station sharing is doing the homework it takes to prepare your station for a guest operator, and for both the guest operator and the host putting in the time to make sure the guest is trained on the station.

All this has to happen in advance of Sweepstakes. Is antenna switching labeled? Are amplifier and antenna tuner settings marked? Any non-standard stuff the guest needs to know?

The guest will need to know your logging software. One good way to do that is for him to set it up on his own computer and use it in a contest. Or, use it on your computer during CQP or CQWSSB (the week before SS CW).

Don't forget the simple stuff like keyers and paddles. If you're doing some mentoring, you're both going to want to wear headphones at the same time. Pick up a headphone Y-adapter at Radio Shack.

Multi-Multi Station Are there enough antennas (and transmitters) that two operations can run simultaneously at your QTH?

If so, plan for just enough operators to keep each on the air for at least 18 hours. Why 18 hours? That's often the point of diminishing returns for one call sign, when you've worked most of who's on the air, and when

you need to think about going to another QTH and using another callsign! When things get slow, it's time to fire up a new rig with a new call sign and a new operator!

Sharing Gear

Many NCCC members have spare equipment – everything from a nice contest rig to a power amp and antenna tuner. Let your Regional Coordinator know if you don't have a decent contesting radio, amplifier, or other equipment. Or, put a post out on the email reflector. Last year, someone needed an amp and had five offers in the first four hours! I've got a couple of spare contesting rigs I can loan to someone who knows how to treat them, including a week or so in advance so they can learn the radio.

Maximize Your Effort, Pass On the Glory For the Good of the NCCC Team

Use the cluster – it makes you more efficient, and makes it less likely that you'll miss mults. Run high power – it's good for more QSOs, especially during slow times! Don't even think about QRP for Sweepstakes –we need the points you could make running QRO!

Making the Most of a Split Site Weekend

Try to find a second QTH that minimizes your travel time. One hour should be the maximum one way, and fifteen minutes is better. That 45 minutes difference could mean another 45 QSOs!

Set up as much of the second QTH as possible in advance. Learn the antennas, figure out computer setup and networking, power for you rig and amp. Thirty minutes of advance setup on Friday could mean another 30 QSOs.

Make sure you have everything you need. Make a list, do a complete setup at the second QTH, run through the switching and tuning for all the antennas, make sure your computer can get on line. Don't forget coffee and munchies.
