

QRV ALL-ASIAN SWEEPSTAKES?

Remember the good ole days? Remember the red team, the brown team, and the yellow team? Well, I don't. Which is enough of an idea to resurrect the idea. What am I talking about? The All-Asian DX Contest, of course. This club made AA what it is today; and to some extent, the reverse may be tlue (just ask Bluce). Last year, the stiffest competition we could find was the SCCC. But, we are now faced with a challenge from a group far more formidable than the also-rans from Smogsville. This year, the competition will come from within.

Our goal is to capture all seven
North American 1st place certificates
(and in the process set more than a few
records). The categories are 80-10 single operator, single band; single op,
multi-band; and multi-op, multi-band.
So you see, you don't have to own a super all-band station to compete. That
80 meter sloper to JA will be very competitive. Also, you don't need to stay
up all night (or all day if you go 40
or 80).

How will this work? This is where the teams come in. Each member who wishes to be involved will be assigned to one of these teams. Then, after the dust of the contest has cleared and the scores are finalized, the team results will be determined according to a formula so complex that it can only be explained by a slick patent attorney. For now, it will suffice to say that if you take 1st place on 80 meters with 6,000 points, it will count exactly the same as if you have won all-band with 70 kilopoints.

Now for the real point. We need manpower to pull this off. If you've read this far, you're either bored or interested. If you're interested, we need you. So contact me, Ron, WA6DGX, at 845-2724, before or at the May meeting, and we will be sure that you are placed in a position where your talents can best be utilized. If you're bored, go back to sleep, as the rest of the Jug is probably even worse (thanks Ron, de VEF).

IT'S VHF CONTEST TIME AGAIN WITH NEW RULES AND REGS

Well, fellow KB'ers, spring has finally sprung, and can June be too far away? No, and this means that the annual ARRL June VHF QSO Party will soon be upon us. In the past, diligent NCCCers have participated in this contest, and this year we again hope to have many entries.

The contest itself is held the weekend of June 11-12 from 1900 to 0600 UTC. You may participate no more than 28 out

of the 35 hours in the contest.

The 1977 June VHF QSO Party marks the end (or perhaps the beginning) of an era -- that of 146.52 simplex domination. In this contest. it is expressedly forbidden to make contest contacts on 52, as well as 146.43 and 146.46, regardless of mode. It is hoped that this action will

p to reduce the hard feelings toward the VHF contester by the everyday ham who wants to use 52. However, nowhere in the rules does it state that a station cannot solicit contacts on 52, and then QSY to an authorized simplex channel. Perhaps this is an intentional loophole.

Also, contest operation on repeater inputs and outputs is forbidden. Basically, what it boils down to is that only a certain set of frequencies in the 146 to 148 mHz range may be used. These are: 146.49, 55, 58 and 147.42, 45, 48, 51, 54, and 57. NO OTHERS ARE PERMIS-SIBLE.

If you have stayed with me so far, perhaps you'd like to know where you can make a contest QSO. Here is a list of suggested and nationally recognized operating frequencies for VHF contesting:

6 meters	
SSB	51.110 and up
CW	50'08 to 50 15
FM	52.525
2 meters	
SSB	145.005 and up. Also, check 144.110 Sat. nite
CW	see SSB. Also in CW band.

2 meters (cont.) primarily on 146.55. see above paragraph. 220 mHz SSB 222.0 to 222.2 CW see SSB 223.5 FM 420 mHz 432.01 to 432.05 SSB CW see 'SSB FM 446.0 1296 mHz Any mode 1296.0

As far as times go, 6 meters should be monitored as much as possible for band openings and on Sunday morning for meteor scatter contacts. Two meter SSB should also be monitored all the time if possible, especially between 8 and 12 p.m. local time for North-South openings. With the new rules change. most 2 meter FM QSOs will probably take place on 146.55. The best time for 220 mHz is at 9 p.m. Saturday and Sunday nights. Monitor 223.5 all the time. On 432 SSB, try to take skeds from 6 and 2 meters, as well as monitor at 10 p.m. Saturday and Sunday evenings. Monitor 446.0 FM at all times, also. As for 1296, 11 p.m. Saturday night and 11 a.m. Sunday morning should do it. all cases, take skeds from other bands.

Multipliers count on each band. others words, if you work WA6BMV/VE8 on 6, 2, 220, 432, and 1296, you have five multipliers, not one. Scoring is done by multiplying total QSO points (1 point per QSO on 50 and 144 mHz, 2 points per QSO on 220 and 450, 3 points on 1296 or higher) times the total number of multi-

Many NCCCers are planning expeditions for this contest, and would appreciate any contacts you could give them. author is still undecided as to where to go, but will probably be on from somewhere.
