GAS ON 160 NOW LEGAL

ARRL BULLETIN NR 57 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CT JUNE 2, 1981 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT


Effective June 10, 1981, FCC will permit U.S. Amateur Radio stations full power privileges on the frequencies 1800 to 1900 kHz, 1000 watts maximum DC plate input. However, some power and operating restrictions will continue to apply to some parts of the U.S. for the frequencies 1900 to 2000 kHz for protecting LORAN A radionavigation systems operated in eastern Canada. Before operating on the frequencies 1900 to 2000 kHz either send an SASE to ARRL Hq for details or wait for the details to appear in July 1981 QST League Lines. Mode limitations of A1 and A3 emission remain in effect for the entire 160 meter band \overline{AR}

Now, for a limited time only, you have the opportunity to fulfill two dreams: helping the NCCC win the CQ World Wide contest, and being the center attraction in pile-ups (the "Hunted," that is, rather than the "Hunter.")

Yes, it's official—the Contest Club is going for an all-out effort in the CQWW, 1981. More than 92% of our membership has indicated a desire to participate in the contest! Our goal? At least 200 Megapoints. And to do it we'll need to man as many contest expeditions as possible. Unlike the ARRL DX Competition, contest expeditions count for Club score in CQWW.

There are many good reasons to go on an expedition. For one, it helps the Club score. It's also great to be the center of attention in pile-ups, and it's just plain fun to "be DX." It doesn't have to cost much, and it will be something that you'll remember forever.

You can also make a much bigger score from operating at a DX location. In last year's CW CQWW, for example, N6RO tallied 1.9 million from his superstation out in Oakley. 8P6J, on the other hand, made 3.3 Megapoints from Barbados. N6TJ, the operator, was using a 3-element tribander and wires, and ran between 200 and 300 watts out for the entire weekend.

If the idea of a contest expedition sounds difficult and expensive, it certainly doesn't have to be. It could be a full-blown trip to Clipperton, but it can be as easy as buying a plane ticket to Vancouver, British Columbia, or loading up the camper with ham gear and antennas and driving a few miles south of the Mexican border. Some approximate cost of trips are:

XE--\$200. VE--\$250. Caribbean-\$900. KH6--\$550. Tahiti-\$1,000.

This includes air fare and accommodations for a couple of days, as well as the contest weekend.

For those of you who would like to try a contest expedition, or would like to discuss it further with the NCCC CQWW co-ordinators, please call Gary, WA6VEF, at 415-538-0520, or Rich, N6KT, at 408-374-6123. Time is running short, even though the first weekend of the CQ is four and one-half months away. Gary and Rich have lined up DX stations in Alaska, Canada, and Mexico, as well as in the Caribbean and the Pacific--stations that are open to NCCCers. Think about it. Now, for a limited time only, you can be DX...

THE AVERAGE CONTESTER 1981 NCJ SURVEY

"The average contester has one station, a C-Line(23%) or TS820(20%) and SB220(31%). Only 29% have an antenna for 160. On 80 most have inverted vee's. ON 40, THE AVERAGE ANTENNA IS A 2 ELEMENT YAGI AT 95'. ON 20 IT'S 4 ELEMENTS AT 89'; ON 15 IT'S 5 ELEMENTS AT 70', AND ON 10 IT'S 5 ELEMENTS AT 65'. FEEL INADEQUATE? REMEMBER, THIS IS THE AVERAGE. ONLY 39% HAD A TRIBANDER, BUT 22% HAD 3 ELEMENTS OR MORE ON 40 AT OVER 100 FEET!!!"
