

CQP 1988 It's Party Time Again!!!

It's just about time for the most well-attended party on the contest calendar!

Be sure not to miss the 23rd annual running of our own NCCC-sponsored California QSO party, slated this year for October 1st and 2nd, 1988. This is the contest that has become nationally recognized as THE premier state QSO party, and is the only radiosporting event where you can win a bottle of fine California wine. CQP is unique in the you don't need a "big gun" station to make a big score, since California stations are truly the "hunted" rather than the "hunters." It's also a great way to pick up new CA counties for the NCCC-sponsored "Worked All California Counties" award.

To coordinate NCCC activity for this year's party, we've divided the Club up into sections. By now, you should have been contacted by one of our CQP area coordinators to find out your plans for the contest. If, by chance, you haven't been reached, here are the Coordinators and their phone numbers:

Our pre-contest publicity campaign continues in full swing for the 1988 CQP. We'll be mailing out three-page promotional flyers to every entrant in the 1987 and 1986 CQPs. Similar announcements will be sent to another 250 or so stations who made 25 or more QSOs in the 1987 contest but didn't submit a log. And, flyers will be sent to another 250 active contesters and DXers throughout the country.

We'll again be enclosing CQP announcments in QSL returns for N6KT's PJ2FR contest expeditions. And, QSL managers WA6AHF and XYL Ferne, along with W6BSY (who handles the YASME QSLs), have again volunteered to stuff CQP literature in the cards they answer. Rules for the CQP will appear in the September issues of QST, CQ, RADIOSPORTING, and WORLD RADIO NEWS, and I expect that N6ADI will cover the CQP in his "West Coast News" column in the NATIONAL CONTEST JOURNAL.

Our awards program will again feature lots and lots of certificates, plaques, and wine. Two new plaques will be given in 1988 to the top Novice/Technician entrant both in CA and out of state, courtesy of Louese, KA6ING. In addition, our friends in the Redwood Empire DX Association and the Palo Alto Amateur Radio Club have again volunteered to sponsor awards.



With sunspot numbers on the rise, along with the help and support of the NCCC membership, it appears that 1988 will be another banner year for the California QSO party. Elsewhere in this issue of the JUG appears complete rules for the CQP, as well as a listing of all-time CA and out of state records.

1988 CALIFORNIA OSO PARTY

Sponsored by the Northern California Contest Club

BEGINS: 1600 UTC October 1, 1988 2200 UTC October 2, 1988 ENDS:

Single operator entries may operate only 24 hours; off times must be clearly marked in the log and must be at least 15 minutes long.

Multi operator entries may operate the full 30 hours.

Stations may be worked once on CW and Phone on each band.

All contacts must be simplex; no MCW.

All CW contacts must be made in the CW sub-band, except for 160 meters.

California stations that change counties are considered to be new stations and may be contacted again for point and multiplier credit. CA stations operating from a county line may be counted only as one QSO.

OBJECT: Stations outside of California work as many California stations in as many CA

counties as possible; stations in California work anyone.

California stations send QSO number and county; stations outside of California send EXCHANGE:

QSO number and state/province/country.

QSO POINTS: Each complete phone contact is worth 2 QSO points. Each complete CW contact is

worth 3 QSO pints.

MULTIPLIERS: California stations use states and VO/VE1-7 and VY1/VE8 for a possible total of 58.

Out of state stations use the number of different California counties for a possible total of 58. CA stations on a county line may be claimed as a multiplier for any or all

of the counties they give in their exchange.

TOTAL SCORE: The total score is the number of QSO points multiplied by the total number of

multipliers.

FREQUENCIES: 160 through 2 meters excluding 30 and 12 meters. CW on 1805 and 50 KHz up from the band edge. Phone on 1815, 3850, 7230, 14250, 21300, and 28500. Novices 10

KHz up from the band edge and 28495.

Try CW on the half hour.

Try 10 meters on the hour 1700-2000Z.

Try 147.54 MHz at 2000, 0000, and 0400Z.

Try 160 meters at 0500Z; 80 meters at 0300 and 0700Z.

DEADLINE FOR SCORE SUBMISSION: All logs and summary sheets must be sent to NCCC c/o Gary Caldwell, WA6VEF, 1830 Polk Street, Concord, CA. 94521 by November 15, 1988. Please include a business size SASE for results. Entries of more than 200 QSOs must include

duplicate sheets.

Special CQP Wine Award to the top 20 single operators in California, along with the top 20 single ops out of state, will receive a personalized bottle of Northern California Contest Club Private Reserve California wine. Wine winners who are under legal drinking age will receive a 1988 California QSO party t-shirt. Special trophies-Chairman's Award to the California single op who makes the most CW QSOs. Other trophies to the mobile single-op or team with the most total QSOs; the high scoring low power entry (200 watts or less) in California and out of state; the top Novice/Technician entry in OC and out of state; and the top club in California (Northern and Southern Cal Contest Clubs are ineligible).
