

It was good to see everyone who made it out to Field Day. As part of the vow to make coming to club events a fun thing, I think it was a success. My first exposure to Ham Radio was at the Field Day site of the Palomar Radio Club, W6NWG, in 1962. As a friend and I



bicycled back from seeing all the fun that was going on, we decided we would both get our licenses. We stopped at Vista Electronics and spent 50¢ buying a copy of Learning the Radiotelegraph Code and an ARRL License Manual, that I think was 75¢. By October I was WN6BRN and he was WN6BRO. Field Day is a great way to introduce new comers to Ham Radio and get them started as contesters. (Yeah, I know, Field Day isn't really a contest.) The Samurai Beverage Tuner (NI6T) managed to get his machete into HP for "Bring Something from Your Shack to Share" night. As I have been struggling to reach DXCC on 80 meters I was inspired by the success Garry has enjoyed with his Beverage antennas. By CQ WW phone I plan to have several Beverage antennas working to bolster the performance of the Gap antenna I have laying on the ground. (Anybody want to come up to a very short antenna raising party to get the Gap vertical?) With the combination of the two I expect to be able to get a flock of multipliers on 80 and 160 that have previously been out of reach. With the dropping sunspot numbers I believe that getting multipliers on the low bands will be a necessary factor in maintaining good scores in the next few years as 10 and 15 meters become less and less productive. If anyone would like to speak on the topic of low band contesting, let me know and we can put you on one of the programs. We may very well see runs of JAs on 40 and 80 meters that will partially offset the lack of runnable openings on the high bands. But to do that we need to be able to hear and be heard by the weaker stations - the 10 watt stations that form the backbone of major runs. Lets focus some efforts to improve everyone's low band results and the club as a whole will benefit.

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

It was mentioned that DICK, AA6MC, operating as G0MFO, was the first person to get Worked All California Counties in CQP. Mucho congrats.



It is on a heavy base and has paddles that adjust up and down. Very nice. Sold in US of A by Palomar. N6EK showed us the Bencher keyer he modified for his ConteXpeditions. The heavy base is replaced with plexiglass making for very light traveling weight. Excellent for the use it was designed for. NI6T discussed his

Beverage antennas and showed us his antenna switch. He also showed us his Beverage "tuning tool", a machette which he uses to trim detuning undergrowth after a rain.

N6TV passed around DEAN Straw's, N6BV, new book about optimum antenna heights for various world-wide paths. Dean used to be a NCCCer. VE3SUN showed the newest Russian call book. TOM ("look Ma, no loading coils"), N6BT, for the good Product Review of his FORCE 12 Antennas in The



"QTH, antenna systems and logging programs were awesome." They had a set of antennae that should have taken all weekend to put up: 3 el yagi 80/75 (!), 4 el 40, 6 el 20, 6 el 15. They competed as a 2A group with 2 HF, Novice, VHF, packet, Oscar. Results: 1060 CW, 1355 SSB, 200 Novice, 170 Oscar Qs for 8900 points thereabouts. Should be top in west.

Fred, K6YT, spent yet another year as Head CW Op with the PAARA group operating W6OTX at Cooley Landing on the Bay south of Palo Alto. They were 2A and managed 750 CW, about 750 phone plus about 800 bonus points. They're still duping so you'll have to find their score in QST.

W1FEA was at a tree farm in the Sierras at 4300 feet working FD station W6PYX along with son, Chad, KC6EWK, Trey, WN4KKN, K2BA and W6TYX, who should become NCCCers. away."





ODE TO A SPOTTING NODE

DE W6ISQ

Sounds like Keats or Schiller, don't it. (Friedrich, not Tom). Some of our members have some carnest thoughts about the Great Remote Node Caper, i.e. "What? Fives and sevens on our node?" We asked Node Noodle, President STEVE, N6ST, to tell us about the experiment. And then, to test how it played in Peoria, as 'twere, we asked a few NCCCers for their thoughts on the subject. Herewith de N6ST, DX Packet Spotting Network Remote Nodes

Over the past several months the SYSOPS of the DXPSN have been performing an experiment involving connections to distant nodes and networks. These connections are not via the traditional digipeater and backbone scheme but are being done via the Internet. So far connections to a PacketClusterÆ system based in Texas and one in the Pacific Northwest have been established. These connections are what allows club members VE7NKI and WA6VEF access to DXPSN.

Comments have been heard that "having those W5's connected keeps causing me to be disconnected from the node". A DX announcement from a W5, W6, W7, AA6 etc. is treated just like any other traffic. If you have trouble staying connected it is due to the level of activity, not the fact that it comes from W5. The same stations which disconnect under these conditions will also have trouble staying connected during a contest weekend. I suggest looking at the W5 announcements as an excellent test tool to allow you to improve your packet system without having to wait for a contest weekend. You should be able to stay connected for days and weeks at a time. If you can't, work on your system until you can.

Careful attention needs to be paid to TNC parameters. Many TNCs are shipped with the parameters not set properly. I can often tell when someone is using straight-out-of-the-box settings on some TNCs. They will connect and almost immediately disconnect (from their end). This will happen several times and either they will go away or my telephone will ring. Some TNCs are shipped with the acknowledgment time set to zero. This causes them to transmit a packet (the connect request) and immediately listen for an acknowledgment of that packet. If it is not received in zero time, the packet is sent again. This will keep happening until the number of retries set in their TNC is exceeded. At which time the TNC will transmit a forced disconnect message. I recommend this number be set to at very least 0.5 seconds, and maybe even 2 or 3 seconds.

Packet requires a better signal than many of the modes we are familiar with. If you have multipath to the node, you may have a terrible time staying connected even if the signal is relatively loud. A weak signal from your station is another cause of frequent disconnects. A TNC will not transmit if it hears a signal. If you are putting out a weak signal that the node has trouble hearing, or if you use a very directional antenna pointed at the node, other stations will likely transmit on top of you and cause you to retry frequently and to be "retriedout" if there is relatively heavy activity on your local node. The best thing you can do for a packet signal is to put up an omnidirectional antenna high and in the clear and then run plenty of power. You want to hear and be heard by everyone that connects to your local node.

The other issue that people raise in relation to W5 DX announcements is that they can't hear them. I have found that they give me good warning that something interesting is afoot and that in an hour or two the signal will start to pickup in our area. But I have also worked a number of goodies recently announced by the friendly W5s on 15 meters when I would not have expected the band to be open that early in the morning. The SYSOPS unanimously agreed to this experiment at a meeting in Sacramento a few months back. Part of the agreement is that the links will never be connected during major contest weekends.

Some of our members commented as follows:

AD6E—Basically adds to the system, doesn't subtract. Gives me a feel for band conditions even though I can't hear what the 5s hear. (I can't even hear a lot of the places some of the 6s announce). It makes me aware of what's out there.

AE6Y — Do not find it helpful. I can't hear the DX. Propagation is too different. There may be other benefits I don't know about yet.

W6DU—S#@&*%^ absolutely useless and ridiculous. Who cares what's on in Texas? Seldom use DXSPN anymore. Use it only for messages. But it is a great technical achievement. Let me tell you what happened. I saw an ad on the net printed by a 5 and I gave him a phone call. I did not recognize the area code, but there are a lot of new ones around here and there are also some 5s working in California. I asked him where he lived and he gave me a street address. I asked if that was in the Bay Area and he said yes. I said what town and he said Houston—which is in the Bay Area, only way down in that other Bay Area. %\$#&@. The basic value of a cluster is for information from local bulletins. The rest is &\$@*\$%.

AF6S—I'm all for it. I can tolerate the 5s announcements and I want to be ready when the band opens to us.

WZ6Z—Clutters up my screen and the channel with useless announcements. I fail to see the value of this linking. I think it's clutter, clutter. For me I still don't have a straight answer on whether or not the passing of all these additional announcements causes extra traffic on our "user to node" local frequency. And if it does cause extra traffic (which it must) does that translate to slower response to our queries of the system? If the system is not being slowed down, and if/when I can filter out announcements from specific nodes in my software, then I will be in support. Until then it is only a nuisance.

KA6ING—As long as it's VE7s and I can talk to Gary and Nikki I like it fine. But as long as it's five-land, they can do away with it. Keep the Northern Sixes and the 7s.

WB6MZQ-Not interested. Not relevant for me.

N6TV—Spots of 7s more useful that the 5s; that is, we can more easily hear them. I think the AK1A program that is used to collect 5s and 7s could be modified to permit just 6s and 7s, and cut out 5s.

W6OSP—If it slows the network then it's not worth having. I work through a digipeter which also slows things down even further. If we really wanted out-of-area announcements, we should work on north-south ties rather than east-west ties. I'm more interested in what LA or Portland is hearing than what Dallas is hearing.

W6CF sent in the following report aptly summing up thoughts and experiences many of us have had:

"I get just as excited as the next person when something new, radical, unusual is done on ham radio. And so, when there was talk about hooking us up with five-land every evening, I though "Wow, great stuff! Let's do it!" Well, it was done, and it's a technological marvel, and the folks responsible for it deserve a tip of the hat. But I agree with comments made recently by Howard Brainen, WZ6Z. It's time to pull the switch on the connection to the fives. It was a good idea, it was fun, but perhaps it was (Con't Page 9, Col. 1)

O-T


Drinks, iced tea, lemonade, fruit juice, soft drinks, beer, ice and ice buckets.

before its time. There are several problems with the system now, as I see it.

First, it fills the screen with spots that are of no or of marginal use. Some claim that the spots are super helpful, for they tell us what the fives are doing and we can anticipate similar activity in the west an hour or so later. And so they do. But how many times have you seen an announcement on packet from someone in Northern California or Nevada saying "Thear fives working Romeo above 14200. Not audible here yet." Isn't that enough? Do we need to respond to fifteen beeps to be told the same thing fifteen times by fifteen spots directly from Texas?

Second, it creates an additional load on the system that causes it to slow down, with the result that many waste valuable time fighting retries. On contest weekends the mail and bulletin features are frequently locked out to avoid slowing the system down. I understand that the SYSOPS also won't put the spots from five-land on the cluster during contests, which certainly makes sense. Still, even when no contest is in progress, every night is now contest night, from the standpoint of activity. Ever try to read a bulletin while the fives are pouring spots into the system? Retry, retry, retry. Wait, wait, wait.

Third, although I support the idea of hams helping hams, and really appreciate how packet has made DXing and contesting easier for me, I sometimes wonder if we're not moving down the path of too much reliance on others. DXers and contesters have traditionally been rugged individualists. Sometimes I wonder if packet isn't turning us all into a bunch of spoon-fed wimps. Some of the questions that occasionally pop up on the screen suggest very strongly that a few folks don't even try to answer their own questions - they go to the screen and let someone else do the work. Could this reliance on more information (spots) from more individuals (fives now) be another manifestation of this trend to rely more on others than on ourselves?

Again, I think the experiment that's brought nightly spots from five-land has been great, and I stand in awe of those who have been able to pull it off. But I believe the time has come to bring the experiment to a close."

This is the sampling of opinion we've gotten to date. What's gonna happen now? Who nodes? Further comments are welcomed.

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
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
