Perhaps one of the best clues I've had to understanding my own reasons has come from the experience of "casual" contesting. I've found that if I join a contest already in progress with the intent of just working a few, then it's difficult to become excited about the contest. With no goal to force me to push myself, the game quickly becomes repetitious and boring. Oh, I can make it more interesting by trying to see who can hear my QRP signal or challenging myself to break the biggest pile-up's with the fewest number of calls, but I eventually lose interest and wander off into other pursuits. That factor which is so conspicuously missing is challenge. It is, after all, a game—a competitive game. And games give us the most enjoyment when we have to stretch ourselves to reach the goal. Without being challenged, we're just going through the motions.

What about you? Is your reaction so very different than my own? You might think about this as we come to the second half of the big Sweepstakes game. Don't sit down just to make a few contacts or it won't be any fun for you. You need to be challenged to give the game meaning. Set a goal for yourself—to make 100 Kpoints, to get a full sweep, or even to get a spot in the QST "top 10" box. And if enough of us are willing to stretch ourselves, we're sure to win that gavel! Let's put it another way. If we don't, somebody else will. And that somebody else could likely be SCCC. Now think ahead to April and all the gloating we'd have to tolerate at Visalia if we don't win it.

### Idle Musings, Part II:

Moving on beyond the original question—"Why do we do it?"-I'm confronted with an even more difficult riddle: "Why do THEY do it?" In the context of this riddle, "it" is all of the time and effort some of our members put into making this club such a success. Have you received your copy of the "Sweepstakes Handbook" yet? There's quite a story behind how that work came into being. CQP entails a lot of behind-the-scenes effort by some really unsung heros. Consider, for another example, the work of putting together the "Jug", month after month. First comes the chore of dragging the raw copy out of each of the contributors and trying to get it from them in time to meet the publications deadline. ### **K6ZM Memorial Station**



Ever since then I've wanted to operate from a BIG station. This last weekend I got my chance when Peggy Frazier allowed me to use the K6ZM station in Danville. Peggy is a wonderful hostess and is delighted to have NCCCers use the station. The hilltop QTH is really great!

Unfortunatey, the station is falling into dis-repair in the antenna department. The station has two towers. The 6 element 10 and 15 meter yagis are in good condition on a 55 ft tower. However, on the 80 ft tower, the big 6 element 20 meter beam has been reduced to only 3 elements and the 4 element 40 is now just a rotatable dipole. To make matters worse, the 40/20 rotator is stuck!

and I really wanted to do a "best ever" performance in this contest. (Bruce, 'ya owe me a beer!).

Well, as my old boss will testify, I've never learned to say no. Thats got me into more trouble than I care to think about. I also thought this would be an opportunity to learn how to use real publishing software.

Now, I think I'm pretty computer literate. I know how to use all the great Microsoft programs like Word, Excel, Project, PowerPoint, and Solitare. I've written my own logging software for CQP which is in some ways superior to CT (and some ways not). So what could be so hard about publishing?

Well, I don't have any "publishing software" for starters. I picked up a copy of "Express Publisher" for \$15 at the local stationary store. When I got it home and installed it, I found out why it was only \$15: A little problem with file conversion and compatibility.

Bob, N6IP, came to the rescue with a copy of PageMaker. Unfortunately, Bob (an expert) didn't have any time to teach me how it works. No probem. Jack (W6ISQ) gave me a disk with the JUG already formatted, and several columns of text already to go in PageMaker format. Gee, this'll be easy.

One of the short-commings of pilfered software is the lack of manuals. Also I didn't know that Jack and Maggie use a funny Scottish computer which uses an odd disk format. I think Margarita said it was a MacIntosh? I'm dead!

N6IP, once again, came to the rescue. He converted the wierd disk into standard PC format. Jacks' file came right up and PageMaker seems to work fine now. Dick, AA6MC sent me his treasurers' report via Internet, Bruce sent his Presidential message via modem, and IP Bob gave me a disk with all the SS scores and stuff on it, including the great story by Jim, KV6S (on page 8). All I had to do was assemble it. The result is in your hands. I hope you enjoy it.

### SS Startup by KV6S

(In the true spirit of NCCC cooperation, Bob - N6IP gave up his station so that KV6S would have a place to operate SS CW. Bob then found himself a QTH at N6ST who was going to be QRT for the CW weekend. A real win-win situation for the club. Jim had a ball in the SS and wrote this article for the JUG - ed)

Sweepstakes CW 1994 was my first real contest and I had a blast!

Can you copy a sloppy fist — at 40 wpm — under twelve other signals — all zero-beat — some (but not all) of them calling you? No way? If you can, then you probably made more than 1000 Q's, a clean sweep, and scored an astronomical number of points in this year's Sweepstakes — and the rest of this article is not for you.

If your CW skills are a bit rusty (like mine) and you are intimidated by even a two-signal pileup, then I want to share with you what I experienced last weekend.

When Trey, WN4KKN, talked to us at the club meeting and insisted that we should operate SS by calling CQ for 24 hours, I imagined a pileup exactly like the one above — and I was intimidated more than a little bit. But Trey was so convincing that I decided to give it a try. The bottom line is that he is right — it works great!

Many good things came together to make SSCW a success for me:

- 1) Bob, N6IP, graciously lent me his station. Everything works in his shack. The computer is running the latest version of CT and it properly keys the transceiver which properly drives the amplifier which puts a nice fat signal into any of several well-matched antennas which can be selected by the click of a switch from the comfortable operating position from which you can reach anything you need to make things happen. The previous sentence is run-on to emphasize the importance of the thought and effort and resources Bob has put into his station it works!
- The latest version of CT can run much slower CW than the older versions. This is important.
  - 3) My bride let me go play with the radios all weekend.

When the contest started at 1 p.m. on Saturday, I tuned around the bands for several minutes. This gave me a chance to get the flavor of the bedlam on the bottom end of 20m and 15m. I almost went home right then! But Trey says ...

So I found a blank spot above most of the chaos on 15m. Trey said the less-adept operators are to be found higher up on the

band and I figured that described me. I set CT to key at 18 wpm. I handled a lot of traffic at 18 wpm, so I am fairly solid there even after years of inactivity.

Then I pressed F1 and CT sent "CQ SS KV6S KV6S" — thank goodness CT did it — my hands were so sweaty I would have slipped right off a paddle.

Nobody answered. So I did it again - and again - and ...

Eventually, someone called and I copied his call and CT sent my exchange and I copied his exchange and it worked, much to my surprise.

So I kept going until 11 p.m. Saturday. By then I was making really dumb mistakes, so I went home to recover. By 11 a.m. on Sunday I was back on the air. I continued to call CQ until 7 p.m.

Why did it work? I think the slow CQ acts as a filter. If someone answers a slow call, he/she must be prepared to make the exchange at a slower speed. If not, I had a message on the memory keyer that asked "PSE QRS". The really good ops who called me were never sent that message — they were already at about 18 wpm. The exchange with those stations was absolutely minimum time for both of us (not that it mattered to me very much, but they were in a hurry). They got my exchange the first time (of course) and I got theirs the first time — no repeats — no fills.

Who called me? Trey was right — everyone answers CQ's. I worked lot of multipliers — Puerto Rico, Alaska, and Yukon were the most memorable. I worked many QRP stations. I figure that is only fair. Even though it takes a long time to work one QRP station (to fill blanks lost in the noise), it does not hurt my rate much (if any) and their weak signal is not likely to break the pileups on the big gun stations. Big guns called me — several NCCC members. Boy, were those easy to work! One station in LA wanted to rag-chew, so I took a while to politely tell him I was in a contest, sign 73's, and get back to calling CQ SS. At least he did not bother any NCCC high-speed ops. Another station called me from STX on 80m to comment on my signal there — 10 over S9 (congratulations to N6IP).

What was hard? Finding and holding a clear spot was hard. Some of the fast ops would think I had vacated the frequency when I had only paused between CQ's. They were so excited that they did not even send "QRL?" first. Ah well — there is some more band higher up for me to use. But eventually, I found the little sliver where the RTTY stations hang out — that is not good. I think one RTTY station decided to teach me a lesson — and he did. I found a blank spot between RTTY

signals and sent "QRL?" No response. So I called CQ. When a station called me, I sent my exchange. When I finished my exchange and started listening for his, all I could hear was RTTY. This happened several times at successively higher frequencies until I was above the band staked out by that RTTY station. I think I need to have the band plan in front of me for the next contest.

How well did it work? I worked almost 300 stations and had some real rushes along the way. Now 300 is not many Q's for a big gun, butthat's OK, I'm not a big gun. In Trey's talk he dwelt for a while on how to stay motivated when the rate falls below 30 Q/hr. Let me say this about that - for me 30 is running fast. At first I tried to average one Q every five minutes - a rate of 12 O/hr. That was about enough to keep me loaded for a few hours. I gradually worked up to 15 then 20. There were bursts (runs?) that pushed the "LAST 10" steam gauge all the way to 30 and even one brief peak at 40. Those were the rushes. The "LAST 100" gauge never exceeded 20, but I can see why you can get hooked on this.

Obviously, I am a long way from being a competent contest operator, but, having experienced SSCW94, I am motivated to try again and maybe I can accumulate the know-how and the skills that will open the doors to even more fun in contests to come.
