Contest Notes A New Contest GridLoc is a new VHF contest, with maidenhead grid squares as multipliers. It will run from 12Z 8 April until 12Z 9 April (operate 18 of the 24 hours); 150W max, Ph, CW, mixed categories. Exchange: grid square & operator name. Scoring: 1 pt/Q x grid squares, per band. See April QST for rules. Good news: ROVERS ARE ALLOWED! (hi).

SprINT The seventh running of N6TR's Internet SprINT begins 0000Z 10 April (Sunday night local time). This is the 2-hour sprint where the exchange is serial number, the name you received during your PREVIOUS QSOs, and state. "Dupes" may be re-worked after working three other valid QSOs. Give it a try!

ARRL EME Contest ARRL's EME contest will be held on 7/8 October and 4/5 November this year. Last year it occurred during CQWW (BOTH weekends). This year it competes with CQP and the CW weekend of SS. ARRL's Billy Lunt claims the phase of the moon determines the optimum weekend for this event. Maybe he should simply reschedule it to a less hectic season...

80 Meter EWE Antenna

The following is detail information not contained in the article "Is This EWE for You?", in QST, Feb 1995, pages 31, 32 and 33. Article written by Floyd Koontz, WA2WVL.

Original article described a shack switchable 80M EWE, however the detail was vague and building another tuner in my shack was not in my plans. So what follows is how I constructed my 80M EWE and how it performs at my QTH.

Construction I didn't want to use suspended wires so I made the vertical 10 foot elements from _" aluminum tubing and connected the two vertical pieces at the top with Nr. #14 wire. I used 8 foot ground rods instead of the 2 _ foot rods described in the original article. I mounted the 10 foot vertical elements just above the ground rod and insulated using a piece of PVC pipe.


9:1 Balun I made the 9:1 balun from T200 core material which I had on hand. I used 11 trifiliar turns and connected the core windings per ON4UN's instruction in his "Low Band Dxing" book, page 7-19, figure 7-21. No rocket science here. See supplied drawing of Fig 7-21

Relays All relays are Radio Shack 12VDC miniature DPDT relays and were glued in place with PVC cement. All

enclosures are Radio Shack specials, all plastic. Reason for all plastic cases is to keep the coax shield and center conductors electrically isolated. Use good size lugs to electrically connect the shield to the coax chassis mount. I initially had trouble when I soldered the shield directly onto the mounting screw. The plastic melted slightly and caused an intermittent ground connection degrading antenna performance in South America direction.

Station Control Box was made in a similar plastic box again mounting all three relays to the bottom of the box with PVC cement. After drying for a few hours I drilled all holes for switches, terminal strips, coax chassis connectors and power terminal strips. I mounted a switch directly in front of each relay. Mounted all the coax chassis connectors in the rear, evenly spaced while allowing for mounting of the two terminal strips. Relay power connections was made with twisted pair wire. All connections from the relays and antenna connectors was made with #12 bare wire. Making sure that all wiring lengths were exactly the same length. (Both Ground and center conductor). Construction is very straight forward. See Photos.


Performance The EWE has absolutely no gain. As a matter fact it has approximately -20db gain. However I am having very good luck receiving on 80M without the Ameco Preamp. However, it performs excellent with the Preamp. Where the EWE shines is the F/B ratio. I have experienced F/B ratios in excess of 25-30db receiving JA's and South Americans. At the time of this article its the only EWE I have put up. Another EWE is being



built for North East and South West. If your planning on building one of these lil EWE antennas, feel free to contact me. I will try to help where I can.




80 Meter EWE Antenna





EWE Antenna Station Control
