In fiscal year 99-00 we hope to collect another \$350 in uncollected CQP plaque pledges. We also have

one more month of JUG expense to go, at about \$150 and about \$300 in CQP expenses. We thus expect to finish the year with about a \$540 loss, about the same as last year and the year before. This year's shortfall was mainly due to 1) setting the holiday award banquet fee deliberately low to avoid a large year to year increase, 2) rising CQP award shipping costs, and 3) a doubling of club awards expense.

The trend of losing \$500/year must be corrected! The '99-'00 proposed budget projects that JUG expenses will go down a bit as more members choose to receive their copy quicker via the website, but domain name registration fees will continue. The proposed budget also reflects the new board's consensus policy of aiming to cover all self-funded programs (CQP awards, dinners, banquets) by 1) expeditious requests for pledge fulfillment and failing that, replacement donors, and 2) rounding up projected expenses to determine user fees.

K2KW and N6BV presented two programs on different aspects of the record-setting CQWW CW effort by 6Y2A. We had an NCCC hospitality suite open both nights this year, with terrific Tied House beer supplied by Ron Manabe, W6RN. On Saturday evening we co-hosted the Contest Pileup CW Copying Contest with SCCC.

One completely new event this year was the Friday night Contester's Dinner. This was a sit-down dinner modeled after the Contester's Dinner held in Dayton. June VHF Contest

Local time in California

By now most of you have one of the new radios that has 6 meters or 2 meters and maybe 430 MHz SSB on it. Now's your chance to try these bands out in the biggest of the ARRL VHF contests. Even if you only have a 2 meter FM radio, you can make a lot of contacts and have a lot of fun in this contest. All the rules are on page 94 of the May QST. Here are the frequencies most used in California where you will find the most action.

SSB / CW

SSB 50.125 calling freq to 50.225 on 6 m. CW 50.095

SSB 144.200 calling freq +/- 50 khz CW/SSB mixed

SSB 222.100 calling freq +/- 50 khz CW/SSB mixed

SSB 432.100 calling freq +/- 50 khz CW/SSB mixed

There is not much activity on 903 mhz in this area.

SSB 1296.100 calling freq +/-50 khz CW/SSB mixed

On higher bands there is little activity; normally only the most experienced multiop stations get on 2304.100, and 10368.100 MHz.

FM

6 meters 52.525

2 meters 146.550, 146.580, 146.490, 147.540

1 1/4 meters 223.500

3/4 meter 446.000

1/4 meter 1294.500

Most of the big guns stay on SSB on Saturday then come over to FM on Sunday when most of the locals on SSB have been worked. If you have more than one radio always keep one radio on 6 meters as the band can open at any time.

The exchange is your grid square, in the Bay Area the west bay is in CM87. The south bay is split in two : west of Lawrence Expressway is CM87 east of

Lawrence Expressway is CM97, the line is the 122 degree line which goes right up through the center of Fremont. In Hayward or north you are still in CM87 until you get to Hwy 4, and north of that you are in CM88. In Marin county south of San Rafael is CM87, and north is CM88. If you are to the east of the 122deg line you are in CM 97 if you are south of Hwy4, and in CM98 north of Hwy 4, which is the 38deg north line.

On the Vhf bands SSB and CW use horizontal polarized antennas and FM is on vertical polarization. Even if you do not have the correct polarization or even no antenna for a certain band connect up what you have and try it. The 17 meter antennas work great on 6 meters.

If you have only a 2 meter antenna up you can use it on 430 MHz no problem and with a little vswr on 222 MHz. I have even worked some one who was using a 2 meter antenna on 1296 MHz.

If you like contesting on SSB and you are on 6 meters when it opens, if you did not look at the frequency readout you would think you were on 15 meters. Now it your turn to get on. If you like contest action, this is the contest. Just ask some of the big guns who started on the June VHF contest like AI6V, or W6OAT, N6TU, or N6NB.

DX that you can expect: 6 meters: mostly Caribbean stations like C6, CO, J6, KP4, KP2, 8P6, P40. On 2 meters and above: for most working stations in Oregon or Nevada will be the highlight, but big guns will work into Canada to the north, Colorado to the east, and Mexico to the south, unless they are moon-bounce equipped, then there is no limit.

There will be lots of mountain top portable stations and some expeditions. Watch on 6 meters for W6JKV/?

That's it for VHF contesting 101 in California! Have fun and see you in the pile ups.

Dayton's Man of the Hour

The FCC's Riley Hollingsworth, K4ZDH, exhorted a standing-room-only crowd at the Dayton Hamvention to "read over the basis and purpose of Amateur Radio and the rules in Part 97" and to operate as if youngsters and overseas stations might be listening in. He made

the remarks Friday, May 14, during the first of two FCC forums in Hara Arena.

Calling Amateur Radio "an American institution," Hollingsworth said, "Ham radio is not about the First Amendment, it's not about slandering somebody you don't like, it's not about ridiculing somebody who's operating 10 kHz away, it's not about jamming or obscenity." Nor, he said, is it intended to be a talk show, an "electromagnetic forum for hate groups" or "an audio version of The Jerry Springer Show."

Hollingsworth called the on-air activities of some hams "childish and stupid--20 years ago we called that CB" and said the hobby does not always present its best face to the world. He also said hams need to understand that demand for HF spectrum in countries outside the US is increasing.

"Too many in our service take the allocations for granted," he said. He suggested that Amateur Radio can do just as much damage as good. "Some of the Third World countries would love to have 75 meters as a national telephone system," he said. What does transpire on some amateur frequencies "is often an international embarrassment."

"Having a right to do something doesn't mean it's right to do it," he said, advising the hams on hand to "look at the big picture here and save our service." He asked hams to not retaliate against hams who are offensive on the air or who break the law, but to shun them instead. He challenged each ham to recruit a newcomer into the hobby or to help another licensee to upgrade. "And don't forget about young girls!"

He also emphasized that Amateur Radio still has a major public service role to play providing emergency communication. "Every ham in America has a decision

to make: Are you going to be a part of the problem or are you going to be part of the solution?" he said.

Commercial interests are eyeing amateur frequencies, he said, and hams should not lose their bands by default. "Amateur Radio has survived world wars, depressions, all the incredible explosions in technology, and if it's lost, we're going to be the ones who will lose it," he said. Hams themselves will determine the fate of Amateur Radio. "We have an awesome responsibility."

Hollingsworth delivered similar remarks at a second FCC forum on Sunday, May 16, where he shared the podium with Bill Cross, W3TN, of the FCC's Wireless Telecommunications Bureau, and also at a Drake collectors group on Saturday. He received an enthusiastic reception at all three venues and was accosted by those who wanted to thank him for renewing the FCC's amateur enforcement program. Some even sought his autograph.
