

After our Christmas/New Year's respite, the second half of the 1999-2000 contest season now begins. January offers the NAQPs and the CQWW 160 CW. February brings the Sprints, the ARRL DX contest (CW), and the CQWW 160m phone test. Several contests occur each weekend, so there is plenty of work to help you ring in the new year. Can't think of a better way to start your new "2000" log than with a couple thousand contest Qs, can you?

I think I can almost positively, definitely promise that this will be the last comments I'll make on SS '99. But wait! More "definite maybes" follow...

While the difference in claimed scores is in the third decimal place, I am very pleased to announce that NCCC has apparently won the Unlimited Club gavel for SS 1999. The best information available puts our score at 12,762,390. PVRC is a close second (but still just that—SECOND) at 12,484,370. This is only the claimed total, of course. Several things will prevent the final published scores from matching these figures: people submitting logs to the ARRL but not announcing their score; people announcing their score but forgetting to submit logs; folks submitting logs but forgetting to state their club; and, of course, the reductions due to log scrutiny. At least the apparent 2% difference is in our favor!

Congratulations on getting on and kicking some butt!

The SS story developed in a most exciting fashion. Our scores were trickling in and showed outstanding effort. Unfortunately, when we heard of PVRC's progress, they were doing even better (PVRC data is hard to get, however, because their reflector and web site are restricted to members.) For weeks, PVRC was well ahead of us. The margin began narrowing. On the night of our holiday party, new scores arrived and we were now approximately even. The difference grew into a few thousand points over the next weeks; slowly creeping higher and higher. After the phone log deadline, PVRC security slipped a bit and their final (claimed) score was revealed. While it was significantly higher than before, it was still 270k points below ours. Let's hope it stays lower!



Actually, it's a matter personal tastes and preferences, so everyone could have a different response - pro or con, beyond the expectations of WAS or DXCC. These minimum expectations are simpler if using QSL logging software. As a contester, a continuous record of thousands of contest QSOs provides some insight as to exactly who and where we are getting the points that make up our scores. Importing the contest data into the QSL database is usually the last step in archiving the contest records. As we enter the new millennium (aka MM), we may want to contemplate the impact of Y2K on our QSL software. Mine only has a problem with the DX countries. Yet I cannot expect a "fix" there (or, an upgrade to Windows) as its author became a silent key five years ago. New software is at the top of my list for New Year's resolutions. Let me share what I've found are my options.

The following table is a list of QSL logging software that provides for downloading demo software via Internet. WinZip is included for obvious reasons. Only a few provide a challenge to get through the actual installation. I did not test any for Y2K compliance. Your search engine should be able to find the WEB site.

Some guidelines or suggestion for evaluation would include the ability in import from your current QSL software, and all your contest software. Most will import from both CT and TRlog. Beyond that, it's a matter of comparison of features and relative cost. As demo programs, there are some limitations imposed (e.g. number of new entries < 40). Yet, most will allow you to control your rig and access Callbooks on CD-ROMs. Reading a list of features and testing them out on a demo before purchase is the real value of downloading, as some features are not well implemented.

The only surprise here was finding that some QSL software *does* provide for direct contest logging, and score keeping. When coupled with DX cluster access via Internet and Callbook data, as you type in a call – you can agree that the new millennium is here.

MORE ON QSL'ING QSL's without SASE's

For years I have faced the dilemma of what to do with stateside QSL's that arrive with no SASE (or even a SAE). My station typically makes 7,000 to 10,000 QSO's per year. My QSL's are \$.35 apiece to print. Now that I live in NV and in a county with only 8 hams, I have established my "house rules" for QSL'ing.

- o Every card received gets answered
- o Every card with an SASE gets answered within a week
- o Bureau cards get answered within a month or two
- o US with no SASE go in a pile that is labeled "When an Outgoing US QSL Bureau Is Available"

The only exceptions are brand new hams who haven't learned the courtesy of an SASE. They get a card and a note. I have 40 years' worth of QSL's in the attic, and I don't especially need any more, although I do look forward to the envelopes from the bureau every month. For those of you who send cards to K5RC, K7GJ, K7ISO, however, if you want one back, please send an SASE.

This is just one person's opinion, however.


