Greetings Kbers!

I would like to first take a moment to thank you for the vote of confidence through your election of me to the office of VP/CC, and the fantastic team of testers that make up the leadership team you have elected. I am humbled to have the opportunity to work alongside such a fantastic group, and honored to serve you in another leadership role in what I feel is the greatest contesting organization in the world amateur radio community.

Introductions
