

From the editor...

It's been a very gratifying eight years

One of the columnists I enjoyed reading over the years is Bob Herbert who wrote for the New York Times. A week or so ago, I saw his column and was saddened to read that it would be his last. He didn't say why it would be his last, but we all know that print media is having its huge share of difficulties in the face of online news and advertisement. So, it's possible Bob was let go by the New York Times, or Bob decided he'd had enough of that and wanted to do something else. The point is, nothing is forever.

I first started as JUG editor with the October 2003 issue. The person who had been editing the newsletter had to stop for personal reasons, and I stepped in as a quick substitute. That has lasted nearly eight years and 91 issues. And, for the most part, I've loved every minute of it. I want to thank Ed Muns for his support for several of those years as my point of contact for getting the newsletter posted on the Website. I also want to thank John Miller for being equally as supportive once Ed moved on from his Webmaster role.

While I'm thanking people, I'd like to thank the presidents and VP/CCs who were diligent about getting their column content to me each and every month. You made a sometimes difficult job that much easier. And, again, I'd like to thank John Miller who as president would give me tons of content, every month.

I'd also like to thank Rusty and John Miller for all the hard work they did recovering nearly all the JUGs ever written and printed, and archiving them for posterity. You guys are awesome. If you take the time to go back along memory lane, and read those JUGs, you'll have more than a few chuckles. But, you'll also notice how much the newsletter has changed and grown over the years.

I know you're thinking, now, he's going somewhere with all this. And, you're right. I am resigning my role as JUG head. I am 64 years old, working full time, doing a lot of travel, and commuting 80 miles a day. I tried juggling all those balls, but I realized as the stress level went up that something had to go. So, editing the JUG was it.

Remember, back when NCCC was first conceived, there was no Internet, there was no email, and there were no laptops. To keep everyone in sync with meeting dates and times and other club information, the JUG was written, printed, folded, addressed, stamped, and placed in a mailbox. Like the first Ford Model T, the JUG type was available in a choice of color – so long as you chose black.

Nowadays, we have the Web, email, reflectors, and all kinds of ways to stay in touch and disseminate information. Much of the benefit of a newsletter can be contained within a dynamic Website. In fact, all our members can easily gather meeting dates and times, and other information by accessing the NCCC Website once a month and subscribing to the reflector. To some extent, then, the JUG is really an anachronism. We could move the president's bully pulpit and VP/CC column to the Website and be done with it. But, that would not change the requirement for those two officers to refresh their content monthly.

My feeling is that NCCC is at a crossroad. If no one steps up to take on the JUG editorship, we could simply add a president's page and VP/CC page to the Website. As long as that is all that's included in the newsletter that should be okay. The newsletter has been the president's message, the VP/CC column, and whatever content others had provided. There have been some good technical articles by members such as K6MM and K6XX. In the beginning, when I first started editing the JUG, I tried to visit some noteworthy stations and write up stories about them. But, by and large, the JUG has been the president's message and the VP/CC column.

Perhaps if I had more time on my hands, I could stir up some creative juices and do more things that make the JUG more fun to read. But, in the end, the editor cannot write all or most of the content. That means others have to provide that content. And, that simply has not been happening.

We are about to elect a new slate of officers and directors. This is an opportune time for someone to step into my shoes, or for the club to decide that the JUG, like so many other print media, has served its purpose and can more efficiently be supplanted by using the Webpage and reflector.

I've enjoyed my editorship but my zeal, these days, is waning. Maybe it is age, being oversubscribed, or just being jaded. In any case, I thank you all for your kind words over the years, your inputs, photos, and suggestions.
