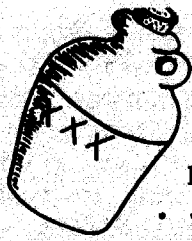

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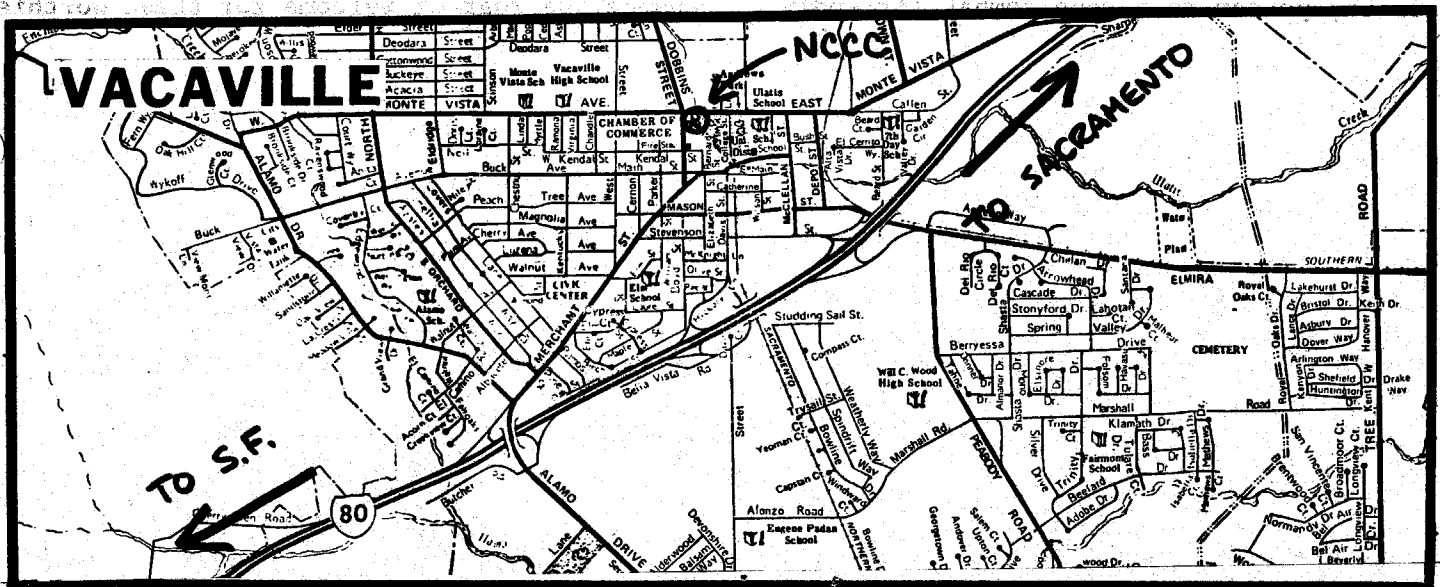

The May 19 meeting of the NCCC will be held at the Chamber of Commerce Building in Vacaville, which is somewhere or other between San Francisco and Sacramento just off Interstate Hwy 80. Coming from SF, take the first Vacaville turnoff, go RIGHT at the end of the ramp onto Alamo Drive. Cross over the freeway and take a RIGHT at the traffic light; that puts you on Merchant St. Three traffic lights later should be Mason; the next LEFT is Dobbins. Pass the Fire Station and you'll find the Chamber of Commerce Bldg. on or near the corner of Dobbins and East Monte Vista. The above map shows it all clearly. . . . If you're coming from the Sacramento direction, you can probably take either of the exits just east of Vacaville. According to my map, they both dump you out on Monte Vista, which you would follow westward until it intersects Dobbins. Or, if you prefer, take the same route as those coming from the SF direction. Who cares? Just show up, that's all. . . . Oh yes, starting time is 7:30 PM sharp, approximately.

STATIONS OF THE MONTH

This month, the JUG adds a new permanent feature: Stations of the Month. It seemed appropriate at this time to provide some kind of statistical summary to give members an idea of what gear is most popular with the NCCC Wild Bunch.

Based on the first 56 questionnaires received by WA6DIL, Collins equipment is the most popular (18), followed by Drake (13), Yaesu (10), Heath (8) and Kenwood (7). Many members have a second receiver on hand, the majority of which are older-model Collins. Eight NCCC'ers have two complete stations, while two have three such!

Fourteen people prefer the ole homebrew when it comes to the cruncher, followed by Heath SB220 (8), Heath SB200 (7), Alpha (5) and Henry (4). Fifteen ops go with tribanders while 16 others like several monoband beams. Most of the latter have two, or sometimes 3, elements on 40, as do several of the tribander group. Dipoles and verticals split about evenly for most of the rest of the gang.

Remember, only members who have turned in their activities questionnaires will be listed in Stations of the Month. -- WB6CEP.

In selecting Stations of the Month, your JUG Head uses a rather complex scientific method. Without going into a lot of technical jargon that would be over the heads of our members, let us merely mention that it involves blindly picking numbers between 1 and 56. Turn this page over and see who's first.
