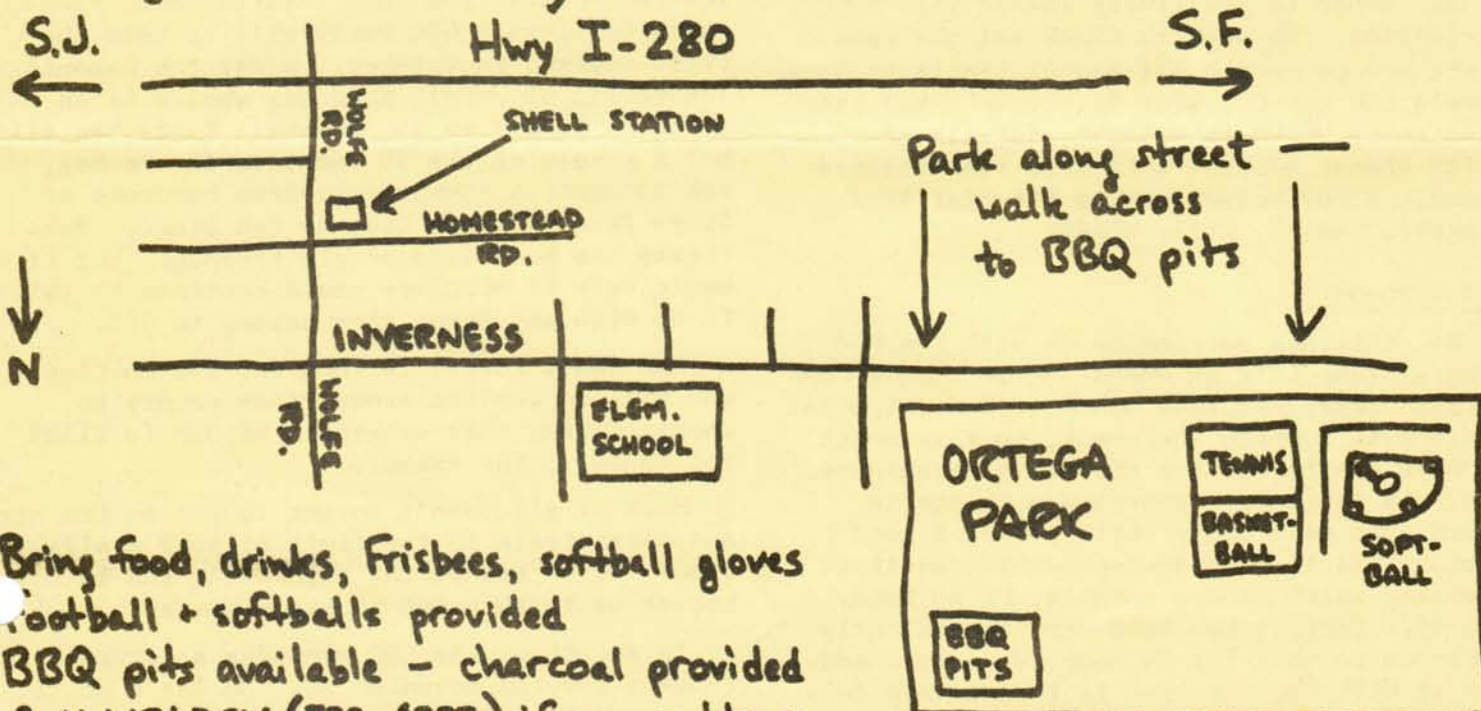

For the eyes of in-territory NCCC members ONLY! Mum's the word!

This is a special page being sent ONLY to in-territory Club members. So far as we can tell, neither of the big East Coast clubs realizes just how close the NCCC is to pulling off the contest miracle of the century. We'd like to keep it that way till Nov. 24!

At the Board meeting last Thursday night we went through the entire roster to realistically predict who would get on at his own station, what stationless operators might be placed in which stations, etc. After eliminating out-of-territory members and people we haven't seen or heard from in many months, we totaled up the scores we felt the remaining NCCC'ers could put together.

If every member comes through with his best effort, we can total 12.5 million points! (The winning club score last year was 8.6 million.) Even allowing for a less-than-perfect turnout plus some visits from Murphy, THIS CLUB HAS AN EXCELLENT SHOT AT 10 MEG AND 1ST PLACE IN THE SS CLUB COMPETITION!

Look at it this way: if 25 "big" stations make 200K (both modes combined) and 40 "little" stations make 100K, that's 9 meg. How many stations in this club do you suppose are incapable of making 50K per mode with any kind of decent operating effort? I'd say none! We're talking about, say, 384 QSO's in 65 sections -- a contact rate of only 16 per hour.

And how many stations with at least a tribander at 50 feet or better, plus something decent on 40 or 80, could not average 100K per mode? VE7AUA/W6 broke 100K on CW last year operating 20 meters only! Considering that our Club broke the 100-member mark several months ago, we ought to be able to muster at least 25 + 40 = 65 stations. Then, when you realize that several stations will score close to 400K, a lot of "big" stations will break 250K and a lot of "little" stations will break 150K, 10 meg doesn't seem all that tough to make.

So what's the big hangup? EVERYBODY HAS

GOT TO PITCH IN AND DO HIS SHARE! If you can't get on for a big effort yourself, go multi or invite a guest operator -- particularly if you have a good station. I know that everyone in this Club is super-busy with other things (I am, too), BUT let's all make it a point to participate in this one big Club event and push the NCCC over the top.

LET'S BREAK EAST-COAST CLUB DOMINATION OF THE SS! LET'S PULL OFF THE CONTEST MIRACLE OF ALL TIME! LET'S WIN THAT GAVEL, SYMBOL OF SWEEPSTAKES SUPREMACY!

Sweepstakes Co-Chairmen and Coordinators

This year we're more organized so far as lining up stations, operators, extra gear, spare antennas, etc., is concerned. As noted in the July JUG, SS co-chairmen are WA6DIL (east of the Bay) and WB6DSV (west of the Bay). However, to take the heavy load off these guys we've gone one step further and divided the Club into nine areas. Each area will have its own Sweepstakes Contest Coordinator (SSCC'er).
