During a softball game in Hayward, the left-fielder on RGG's team crashed full speed into chinning bars beyond foul territory while attempting to catch the ball. He was spun around and came to rest on the asphalt. At first the player seemed OK. Later in the game, however, he began having convulsions and also had difficulty breathing. RGG ran to his car, yelled for assistance on 450 (WR6ADM NCCC repeater) and Mitch responded. Within a minute, an ambulance was dispatched. It arrived in time to revive the ball player, who, by this time had stopped breathing.

Congratulations and Thanks to both Bob and Mitch for their effort and for showing that the skills used to up the rate and KB can also save lives.

Reliable sources suggest that PVRC plans to grow even bigger this year by recruiting in the Baltimore area. Even now, they outnumber us by almost 2-1. However, as last year proved, quality can definitely make up for lack of quantity.

STATION ACTIVITIES

WA7NIN - Pat has new phased verticals for 80/75 mtrs. They are a pair of Hy-Towers and use what Pat calls "passive phasing". This is using capacitors rather than the usual method of phasing lines to obtain the proper phase relationship. It sure does give good front-to-back and seems to have good gain, too. Pat is also putting up new tower at proposed house site to see if the proposed neighbors are going to accept it or not. He is also working on a "antenna range" using a 300 long storage facility that just happens to have a metal roof.

WB6JGS - Harold is now active with a new 40' tower mounted upon the roof making his total height about 60'. Atop this nice structure is a TH-3 and coming off it from the top are a 40 mtr sloper (oh, love those slopers) and an inverted yee for 80/75 mtrs.

W6MSF - Carl, with the added muscle of his brother-in-law, Frank and W6KQG, Bruce, managed to mix and pour the base for his new big crank-up tower. WAØENP/6 showed-up to help, but the work was about 2/3 done. Carl has a 5-ele KLM for 20 (expanding to six ele) and 2-ele for 40 to go on this tower. On the other short (50') tower is the KLM 5-ele 15 mtr and the Wilson (really long boom) 6-ele 10. Another tower of about 30-40' will support his big VHF antennas. Oh, yes - cannot forget the Hy-Tower(s) for 80/75.

K6SG - George recently purchased a used (who can afford the new price??) 75S3C and 32S1 to upgrade his station for the coming contest season. Note - that George needs XTALS.


