

) latter events, because we don't want to spread ourselves too thin and risk diluting our top priority efforts, but many members still plan to be active in these events and competition will be keen.



MORE ON THE NCCC FOUNDER'S TROPHY

The NCCC Founder's Trophy will be a perpetual trophy to be awarded by Jim Neiger, N6TJ (coincidentally the founder of our club) to the NCCC member achieving the highest combined scores in the CQ World-Wide Phone and CW DX contests. The qualifications are:

1) Only single op, all band entries will qu-

alify.

2) All operations must be within the official NCCC territory; DXpeditions don't count.

3) Operator and station owner must be a paid up, full NCCC member.

4) Both phone and CW operations must be made

by the same op.

The trophy (and individual plaque) will be presented at the International DX Convention (Tresno, Visalia or whatever)

CONTEST CHAIRMAN'S CORNER

Look out! NCCC is on the move again in 1978-'79, and frankly, I'm excited about serving as Vice-President/Contest Chairman for the coming years.

At the first meeting of the new BoD last Thursday evening, it was decided that our club will make serious efforts in three contests in the coming year: the California QSO Party, Sweepstakes, and ARRL DX. As VP/CC, I intend to become directly involved in the preparation for all of these efforts. To this end, I will be serving on WB6DSV's CQP committee and will also be assisting SS chairman WB6JUD in this year's quest for gavel #4.

One area in which I see great strides being taken this year is operator training. It's obvious that in order to become an efficient contest operator, one must learn basic operating tech-niques and fundamentals, and then practice those learned skills by getting on the air. I have already contacted a few of NCCC's more talented operators, and they have indicated an entusiastic willingness to do some multi-singles with some of our younger members and less experienced members, giving tips and providing lots of operating time. If any of you would like to be a

t of these multi-single training efforts, please feel free to contact me.

To further public relations with the contest fraternity and make the NCCC better known both nationally and internationally, I plan to introduce to the NCCC BoD a proposal, calling for our club to sponsor an award to any amateur who has worked a specified number of NCCC members in radio contests. This award will be available to any foreign amateur who contacts 35 NCCCers, any US or Canadian amateir who works 75 NCCCer's and any NCCCer who works 100 fellow members in contests. I feel that our award would accomplish three objectives: a) promote general contest activity, both within and without the NCCC. b) make the NCCC better known as stated before, both nationally and internationally, especially among the JA operators. c) to encourage contes. ters to look for NCCCer's. Of course, we will need funds to get this project started, and with the current treasury, I don't see any way that we can put this awards plan into action right away. However, I believe that this proposal is a good one and I plan to push forward with it in a few months time-be on the lookout for complete rules in upcoming JUG!

NCCC BACKPACK CLUB

All members interested in going backpacking this summer with other NCCCer's should see Bob, W1ARR at the pizza parlor after the meeting. This will be a moderately easy pack trip. Those who have already expressed an interest are:N6JM, N6LC, WA6HJV, AA6UO, N6KG, WD6CHF, WB6ZGY, N6NE, and W1ARR/6.

THE NORTH AMERICAN SPRINT

With the success of last year's <u>Sprint</u> (some 400 entries), the NCJ has decided to hold two more; one in July, the other in September. Here are the complete rules for the first:

O1:00 to 05:00 UTC, July 2. Open to any licensed amateur. The object is to work as many N.A. stations as possible (and/or other stations for those in North America) as possible and in as many multipliers as possible during the contest period. Operations must be Single Operator, with me assistance from spotting nets, etc.

The Sprint continues ...

Suggested frequencies (80, 40, 20 meters, only) 3530-3550, 7030-7050, 14030-14050 KHz. Stations may be worked once on each band, CW only.

You must make the following exchange, all parts: His call, your call, serial number (start with 1), your name and state (or VE province or country).

EXAMPLE: JA1KSO de KØTO nr 32 Tod Mn KØTO de JA1KSO nr 16 Nob JA

Only a complete, correctly copied and logged two way exchange shall count as a valid contact. Logs must include the time of each contact. Only one callsign may be utilized during the contest by one Op. A North American station is defined by the rules for the CQWW contests.

North American stations should multiply total valid contacts by the sum of states, VE provinces and other countries to get final score. Other stations multiply contacts by sum of states, and VE provinces and other North American countries. KH6 is not a state and is not in N.A. VE multipliers are: Maritime (VE1, VO1 and VO2) and VE2 through VE8.

North American stations may work only one station in response to a solicitation. Thereafter he must move at least 1 KHz before working another station, or at least 5 KHz before calling CQ or QRZ again. Any entry may be disqualified for illegibility, incorrectness, or illegal or non-ethical operation. Disqualifications are at the discretion of the NCJ Contest review committee.

Team competition is limited to a maximum of 10 operators. Pre-contest requirement: To qualify as a team entry, the name and callsign of each operator, and the callsign of the station operated must be registered with N6SF. The information must be contained in either a letter

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which must be received by NSSF at least 24 hours before the start of the Sprint, or it may be contained in a Western Union mailgram dated at least 24 hours before the start of the Sprint. The are no distance or meeting requirements for a team entry.

A trophy will be awarded to the highest-scoring entrant. Certificates will be awarded to the highest scoring entrant from each US call district, Canada and other country; to each of the ten highest scoring entrants; to each member of the winning team; and to the highest scoring entrant on each team. Entries must be received by August 1: send them to Rusty Epps. N6SF, 35 Belcher St., San Francisco, 94114. An entry consists of (1) a summary sheet showing contacts by band, total contacts & multipliers, name and call of operator, station callsign and location. (2) A complete, legible log of all contacts, including dupes, and indicated, numbered sequence of each multiplier. (3) A separate check sheet for each band.
