Congratulations to the club members who braved mosquitos and skinned knuckles to participate in the ARRL Field Day. A group of NCCCers led by Chuck, AA6G, racked up a really big score. Also notable was the effort of the Foothills Amateur Radio Club (K6YA), led by NCCCers Stan, K6MA, Steve, KE6PQ, and Al, AG6D. Having tired of beating the CW contingent of their arch rivals, the Palo Alto ARA, year after year, the Foothills groups decided to concentrate on public relations this year. Their stations were set up at a public park in Mountain View, guided tours of the setup were given to countless members of the public, the mayor was persuaded to proclaim Amateur Radio Week in honor of the unselfish emergency communications record of radio amateurs, all this was heavily publicized in the press, etc. Remember, good public relations is the key to eliminating unreasonable TVI and antenna zoning regulations.

#### Minutes of the June NCCC Meeting

A small but enthusiastic group of 18 NCCC'ers assembled at the Hayward meeting place for the June meeting. Following officer reports, the following occurred:

- ED, AJ6V announced that Jim, WA6AUE had consented to be the Finance Chairman. Letting no grass grow under his feet, Jim had a copious supply of cold drinks available at the meeting and, at \$1.00 each, raised some money for the Club treasury.
- In lieu of a July meeting, the annual NCCC picnic will be held on August 4 at the new QTH of AJ6V.
- Suggestions to print the NCCC membership application in the JUG received a favorable response.
- W6SZN reported on the medical condition of All present send their greetings and best wishes to Cam for a speedy recovery.
- Bert, K6CSL reported on Armed Forces Day. The Navy was disappointed in our participation this year, inasmuch as Bert was the only NCCC'er who showed up. Bert reported that the Navy is considering cancelling future operations at NPG or may invite other clubs to participate.
- A motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously that the budget as printed in the June JUG be approved.
- George, WB6DSV reported on recent CAC activities. George indicated that there was some negative reaction to the mailings made by the K6GSS crew prior to the VHF contest. (The real complaint was that K6GSS and his crew thought of it first, not that mailings were made - Ed.) George indicated that a proposal has been made to base the club categories for ARRL contests on size of the club membership, rather than on the number of entries submitted. George said that the proposal has strong CAC support. members in attendance voted unanimously to oppose the proposal.
- Alan, K6XO presented CQP awards to W6SZN and 8. K6HNZ.
- Kip, W6SZN reported on the ARRL Pacific Division Convention and on the ARRL club renewal program, pursuant to which affiliated clubs may keep \$2.00 of each member's ARRL membership renewal. Kip also discussed the USQSL Service and the need to liberate CQP cards from that service. A motion was made, seconded and passed (15-2) that the BOD provide a club roster and the necessary postage to KM7Z to get cards for NCCC members sent to the secretary for distribution at future NCCC meetings.
