1986 CALIFORNIA QSO PARTY

Sponsored by the Northern California Contest Club September 27th and 28th, 1986

Well, here we go!!!

We're only a month away from the 1986 running of the California QSO Party and, by all indications, this year's contest promises to be the biggest and best ever.

For this year only, we have moved the CQP to the last full weekend in September (because of a scheduling conflict with RADIOSPORT Magazine's new IRSA DX Contest). We will return to our traditional slot, the first full weekend in October, in 1987. So, be sure to mark your calendar for September 27th and 28th for this year's test.

Our goal for the 1986 California QSO Party is, plain and simply, to bring about a dramatic increase in overall participation in the contest. CQP activity in the past few years has been on the decline, both in and out of state. We really need to beef things up, especially if we want to maintain our position as the biggest state QSO party of all.

To do all of this, a large core of the NCCC faithful has volunteered to help with coordinating this year's event. We've divided the Club up into sections and, by now, you should have been contacted by one of our CQP Area Coordinators to find out your plans for the contest. If, by some chance, you haven't been contacted, here are the Coordinators and their phone numbers:

We'll have, as well, help from the Southern California Contest Club in generating activity for the contest, as the SCCC has decided to participate in this year's CQP as a club project.

We'll also be using the United States Postal System to help publicize the 1986 contest. All amateurs who have sent in a CQP log during the past two years will be receiving a three-page promotional announcement for the contest. A similar announcement will be mailed to about 500 active contesters throughout the country, and KA6ING will be stuffing about 700 CQP flyers into 8P9AR QSL returns. We've also sent out CQP announcements to the usual magazines and publications in time for inclusion in their September '86 issues.

The awards program for the 1986 CQP has been greatly expanded as well. As this is the 21st birthday of the Cal QSO Party, the Club is giving away a special prize for this year's contest — a personalized bottle of NCCC Private Reserve California wine to the top 20 single-op entries outside of California, as well as to the top 20 single ops in state. There will be lots of trophies for the top scorers, and a participation certificate for any station that achieves at least 100 QSO's in the contest. Please see the CQP announcement elsewhere in this issue of the JUG for a complete listing of our awards program.

All in all, this is shaping up into a major Club operating event. We anticipate participation by at least 200 California stations, and should have no problem activating all 58 California counties. And, by the way, we are also making a big push to increase overall CW activity, which should please our vocal code-only contingent! Next month's JUG will feature a complete breakdown of who's going to be where for the test.

RUNNING RATE (It's Rate Time!!)

RUNNING RATE is not the same as referring to simply RATE. RATE is your QSO's per unit time. RUNNING RATE refers to a special, unique situation.

* Def.: When your number of contacts is limited ONLY by your ability to select calls and to send and receive exchanges.

TO RUN RATE ----

WI6Y

- -) Recognize it as a "rate situation."
- Send calls and exchanges only ONCE.
- -) Limit the times you send your own call.
- -) Limit "Thank you's," "Good luck's," etc. to ZERO-
- -) Keep your signal on the air.
- -) Remember that there are others waiting.
- -) Come back to or with a partial call.

- Try to take tail-enders. -)
- -) Have a "stack" in your mind.
- -) Listen off your own frequency.
- JA's have them stand by occasionally. -)
- -) Return to the faster and/or louder signals, because chances are that they will not stay around, but the weaker/slower ones will since they don't expect to get through.
- -) Maintain a sense of urgency.
- -) Listen for encroaching signals.
- -) RESPOND AFTER THE CALLERS GIVE ONE CALL. This will set a pace, or rhythm, to your operation.
- Be in command and in control at all times. Otherwise, it will appear that you do not know what you are doing.

MAXIMIZING SCORES

There is always a controversy over what to do when it comes time either before the contest when planning strategy, or actually during the contest, as to which to do -- run rate or look for multipliers. Perhaps the following will assist you in your own plans. DOMESTIC CONTESTS -

In all but one of the current domestic contests (the North American Sprint is the exception), there is usually sufficient time to either locate all the possible multipliers or have them call you. The section on what we do with our time shows that in Sweepstakes, for example, we spend only about 25-30% of the total time actually making exchanges. This leaves a lot of time for us to locate this "finite number of multipliers." This term really means
"finite equalizer," since with a clean sweep, the only
factor left in the scoring is QSO's. This being the case,
it is probably a better plan to push rate at the beginning, when it is available, and then to look for the multipliers later, like on Sunday, when the going is slower and a search and pounce rate can match or exceed a CO rate.

The North American Spring, by virtue of its short time (only four hours) and QSY rules, consumes more like 50-60% of our time actually passing exchanges. This condition really puts the pressure on running rate for the duration

of the contest and depending more on luck to find the multipliers.

DX CONTESTS -

There essentially is no "finite equalizer" in a DX contest. Consequently, multipliers become a more important factor in the scoring. We must be sensitive to conditions and what is going around us (do not want to miss someone else working a new multiplier a kc away.) Special multiplier "HOT SHEETS" of easy-to-get-but-missed-so-far multipliers placed in front of the operator(s) will help. Search and pounce techniques at lower rate times will lift the rate and fill in the multiplier list.

A few things to remember -

Try to maximize the QSO's at all times, either by running rate or by efficient search and pounce. Effective search and pounce requires an up-to-date dupe sheet. When running a fairly high rate, remember that sometimes the stations come in "bunches." Also, JA's are found in "pockets" across the band and the only to find them is to call a CQ while doing search and pounce.

IT'S SPRINT TIME AGAIN

If it's September, it must be time again for the North American Sprints! The dates are as follows:

CW: 00Z-04Z, September 14 (Saturday, September 13 : local time)

SSB: 00Z-04Z, September 21 (Saturday, September 21 local time)

The organizing efforts of W6RGG and WA6VEF for the February 1986 Sprints really paid off, as no fewer than 23 NCCC'ers submitted scores to the NCJ for the CW version, with many other NCCC'ers active on one or both modes.

1986 California QSO Party

Sponsored by the Northern California Contest Club

1600 UTC September 27, 1986 ENDS: 2200 UTC September 28, 1986

Single operator entries may operate only 24 hours; off times must be clearly marked in your log and must be at least 15 minutes long. Multi operator entries may operate the full 30 hours. Stations may be worked once on CW and Phone on each band.

All contacts must be simplex; no MCW.

All CW contacts must be made in the CW sub-band, except for 160 meters. California stations that change counties are considered to be new stations and may be contacted again for point credit.

Stations outside of California work as many California stations in as many California counties as possible; stations in California work anyone.

EXCHANGE: California stations send QSO number and county; stations outside of California send QSO number and state/province/country.

Each complete phone contact is worth 2 QSO points. Each complete CW contact is worth 3 QSO points.

MULTIPLIERS: California stations use states and VO/VE1-7 and VY1/VE8 for a possible total of 58. Out-of-state stations use the number of different California counties for a possible total of 58.

TOTAL SCORE: The total score is the number of QSO points multiplied by the total number of multipliers.

FREQUENCIES: 160 Meters through 2 Meters excluding 30 and 12 Meters. on 1805 and 50 KHz up from the band edge. Phone on 1815, 3850, 7230, 14250, 21300, and 28500. Try CW on the half hour.

Try 160 meters at 0500Z. Try 80 meters at 0700Z.

DEADLINE FOR SCORE SUBMISSION: All logs and summary sheets must be sent to NCCC c/o Gary Caldwell, WA6VEF, 1830 Polk Street, Concord, CA 94521 by November 1, 1986. Please include a business size SASE for results. Entries of more than 200 QSOs must include duplicate sheets.

AWARDS: Certificates to the highest scoring single operator entry in each California county, each state/province, and each country, and each station that scores 100 or more QSOs.

Trophies to the top three out-of-state single ops; the top three California single ops; the top multi-single and multi-multi in California; and the high scoring single-op and multi-op California county DXpeditions.

Special CQP 21st Birthday Award--The top 20 single operators in California, along with the top 20 single operators out of state, will receive a personalized bottle of Northern California Contest Club Private Reserve California wine. Entrants who qualify for the wine, but who are under the legal drinking age in their area of jurisdiction, will receive a personalized 1986 California QSO Party T-Shirt.

Special Trophies -- Chairman's Award, sponsored by WA6VEF, to the California single op who makes the most CW QSOs; Secretary's Trophy, sponsored by NV6Z, to the mobile single-op or team with the most total OSOs.


