will she have the same call?



# Contest Voice Keyer Update CT Now Supports Voice Keyer STOP

K1EA's CT now supports immediate stop for the voice keyer presented in the October and November, 1991 JUG. This addition was made in CT version 7.21. Like the CW keyboard implemented in CT, the voice keyer immediately aborts transmission when the ESC key is pressed. Two circuit designs are shown.

#### Circuit Description

The voice keyer incorporates STOP exactly like other messages. Pin 2 on the parallel port pulses high for a few milliseconds when the ESC (escape) key is pressed. This pulse is inverted and the voice keyer address and start lines are driven. This can be performed in either of two ways. The simplest uses a 2N3904 or equivalent NPN transistor. The other recruits an available inverter from the 74HC04 Hex Inverter IC.




Figure 1. STOP Implementation with Added NPN

The 2N3904 solution is formed by connecting a  $1k\Omega$  resistor to Pin 2 of the Centronix connector. The other end of the resistor goes to the NPN base, and its emitter is grounded. The collector parallels the STOP push-button switch. Now, when CT pulses parallel port pin 2 high, the NPN transistor turns on and activates the STOP "message". A  $0.02\mu F$  capacitor from base to ground reduces computer noise. See Figure 1. Circuit additions are shown in bold.

Instead of adding another active device, we may use an available gate from the 74HC04 Hex Inverter IC. This version requires two resistors, two diodes, and a capacitor. The connection between 74HC04 Pin 14 and Pin 13 must be cut. The STOP signal arrives on Pin 2 of the Centronix connector and passes through a low-pass filter consisting of a  $1.5 k\Omega$  resistor and  $0.02 \mu F$  capacitor. This filter reduces any




Figure 2. STOP Implementation with Available Gate

noise from the computer. A  $15k\Omega$  resistor to ground pulls the inverter input low if the cable is not connected and insures that inverter output is normally high. When the positive-going pulse arrives on 74HC04 Pin 13, the inverter output (Pin 12) pulls low. ISD1020 Pin 9 pulls low through one diode, which calls the STOP "message" address and the other diode drives the start input. The keyer then plays the very abbreviated STOP "message". See Figure 2.

I recommend the NPN transistor circuit if you are adding to an already constructed keyer.

The STOP "message" interrupts any currently playing message and forces receive mode. If STOP is activated without a message playing, the transmitter will key briefly. Operation with the voice keyer becomes much more comfortable, since I know that any keyer false starts are quickly rectified directly from the keyboard. The voice keyer no longer requires scarce operating desk space as it only must be accessed when messages are re-recorded. We now need a DSP expert to develop a full QSK 'phone transceiver and voice contesting will become almost as refined as CW!



Dear Friends,

We have concluded our operation as XU8KG. We were on the air for only 10 days, but managed to work 105 countries. A girl, XU8DX, was very helpful in all of our activities. We operated from the PTT. . The 2 directors of the PTT were familiar with amateur radio and were of great help. # NEW GARDEN SPECIES FLORAL ANTENNA



## Cutting Edge Sharpens Antenna Performance

Backyards may one day grow a new kind of flower.

Researchers at the Georgia Institute of Technology have found that television and other dish antennas work better if their edges are cut like flower petals. By gradually reducing the electrical field at the edge of the dish, the petals provide better reception and transmission.

Scientists have tried to reduce uncontrolled scattering of energy

in parabolic antennas by rolling the outside edges, placing absorbent materials around the rim or adding triangular serrations. Nothing has worked as well for the money as flower petals, says Edward Joy, professor of electrical engineering at Georgia Tech.

"The rolled edge works better, but it's very costly," says Dean Mensa, senior technologist at the Navy's Pacific Missile Test Center in Point Mugu, Calif. "The flower petal is a good compromise between cost and performance."

Flowery antennas haven't yet begun to spring up in backyards, but Dr. Joy predicts they will as more communications satellites go into orbit. Ground-based antennas will have to be better designed, to receive only the signals meant for them, he says.

The floral antenna was an accident, Dr. Joy says. "We told the computer how much we'd like the electric fields to fall off, and out popped a flower petal."

## It is proposed as follows:

Replace Article III, Section 1 Header with:

Section 1: The Club shall be comprised of three classification of members: Full, Associate and Family

Add to By-Laws, Article III, Section 1 after section B:

C. Family Membership is available to families who have two or more licensed amateurs residing in the same household. Membership standards for family members shall be the same as for full members. One family member shall pay full dues and the remaining ones shall pay at the associate member rate. All family members shall be considered full members, except that only one copy of the JUG shall be sent to the household.
