The FIVE MEG AWARD has generated lots of interest since it started in July 1986. From time-to-time, rules and standings will be published in the JUG. Any questions about rules, or points' standing, should be addressed to the VPCC and/or AD6E.

# **PURPOSE**

This award is intended to give recognition for sustained efforts by NCCC members. All too often club members with moderate stations, compete yearin and year-out without a reasonable chance to win major awards. The Five Million Point Award is designed to rectify this situation and is issued on a once-per-person basis.

# RULES

- 1. This award requires the accumulation of five million points.
- 2. Point totals shall be accrued by the VPCC from copies of Summary Sheets which the contestant has submitted as a valid Entry.
- 3. Any contest entry may be submitted provided entrant is competing from NCCC territory. (Award con't. page 2,)

 Participation with a Multi-Multi or Muilti-Single station can count for this award. To calculate your portion for this award, divide the total score by the total number of operators and submit a summary for that portion of the effort.

# HOW TO ENTER

Send a duplicate copy of your Summary Sheet to the VPCC. In the case of club contests, two summary sheets should be submitted. One sheet for the club entry and a second sheet marked "Five Million Point Award". In any event, the summary should be clearly marked "Five Million Point Award".

ING: And if you want to see a print out of all your contest scores that have been scored for your Five Meg award, send SASE to AD6E.



# SAGA OF THE BEES CONTINUED

Having been deluged with inquiry about the long absence of Captain Cassidy's Bee Training Epic we now put fears to rest, and present final episode:

# THE ODD ONE

# CHAPTER VII, SOCIAL STRUCTURE

Meanwhile, on warm days you can stand off to the side of the entrance, and observe the social structure of the hive. You will note guards walking their beat, performing their assigned duties which are to prevent any one not of the hive to enter. They expect the returning workers to check in for the seell test. The workers, figuring that their time is valuable, try to rush by the guards. The guards will leap into the air trying to catch the culorita, Absolutely engrossing:

Ants will also try to sheak into the hive looking for a quick lunch. The guards will chase these away. Persistence does not work for the ents, when they do make a nuisance of themselves, the guard bee will actually turn and kick them off the landing platform with a stundy blow from one of their back legs. And, if the ant is both persistent and agile, the guard will give them the full treatment. This means the ant is picked up by the bee, the bee flies away from the nive and uncersmonlowely drops the ant from any handy height.

Rogber bees will also come, flying in like they are coming home from a hard day of foraging. Some will fly directly into the hive without first landing and then walking in, seeking to circumvent the check point.

You can see a robber bee sheak into the hive, they usually are black, glossy and a bit tattered. They fly right by the quards, the guards sound an alert, and in a few seconds the robber bee will be literally dragged out of the hive by two or three busky bees and flung over the side. Actually, both sides are trying to get in a quick sting. It is supprising to see how much they can fight without anyone being damaged.

On not days the ventilating bees will line up a the entrance, beating their wings as fast as they can and forcing air into the hive for cooling.

When a new crop of workers have hatched, they first aust put in their time at housekeeping duties before being promoted to the rank of "Forager". You will see these newly promoted bees flying in front of a hive, heads always facing to the hive and just hovering there and getting their orientation fixed for future nevigational needs. They will do this for hours and it will be often noted during the summer months.

You can see returning foragers doing a dance on the landing platfors to advise those leaving where flowers and mectar can be found. You can see all this and a lot more. And if you do not visit the hive for a south or so, as long as they have roos to store honey and pollen, for you they will work a full day every day of the week. Only cold weather, below fifty degrees, or some inclement weather will keep them in the hive.

And when you visit with our neighbors over the back fence, let them know you are among the esoterics. A Beekeeper! And your craft linese goes back to Biblical times and much further. A bonorable and fascinating enceavor. And you have hardly started on the great work.

If you have lasted this far you have qualified for the first level in the Hester Beekeeping Course. Now when people ask how you satually get the honey, you can smile knowingly, nod your head and say: "Why, it's rether simple. All you do is open the epigot on the bottom side of the hive and the honey pours out. Just hold your jum steady".

As you learn more about honey bees, and everyone should, you will find that they have a very organized social structure, with job assignments, upward mobility and a long cultural lineage which is sometimes evident. On a warm number evening often you can see bees clustered outside the hive on the landing board and the front of the hive. If they are Italian bees and you listen closely, some beckeeper say that you will hear them singing in chorus. What are they singing "Torna a Surriento". Naturally.


HOME LICENSES ARE MUCH MORE DIFFICULT AND THE - RED TAPE TAKES A GREAT DEAL OF TIME.
