WPX Club Competition

Congratulations, I think you've done it...174 Megapoints! A nice margin over last year's record 126 Meg by some other group. NCCC should now retake the club championship and the record—something we've held every year this decade (except last year), and for much, if not all, of the 1980s. The old saying states "a rising tide lifts all boats"... our competitors also reap the benefits of increased dynamism due to the elimination of the dreaded zero point domestic QSO. However, NCCC is the expert in WPX club competition, so we get the largest benefit. Our big effort this season should stand as a new record (for at least another year)!

The rumored coronal hole didn't wipe us out, and we enjoyed the best WPX CW conditions in memory. Several of us, especially AE6Y, blasted through our score commitments and stayed in the contest longer than planned, simply because it's fun operating under good conditions. The demise of zero pointers helped greatly as well.

I generally play mostly on 40m because of the bonus points, but this year, most ops abandoned the low bands because of the long openings on 15m. Other commitments (daughters' dance recital—can't they schedule those things away from major contest weekends?) kept me off the air until 11PM Saturday, and upon first power to the 40m yagi, the SWR skyrocketed, indicating a blown loading element. Guess who was working on the tower at midnight? Sure glad there was a gibbous moon so I didn't need the

flashlight. The operation was a success, fortunately, and my score commitment was exceeded.

Field Day

Instead of enjoying the great food, hospitality, and camaraderie at K6ZM's, I "got" to host a gaggle of eight-year-olds at a birthday party. Prez Ed tells me that field day was indeed a good time and included a discussion regarding our big contest of the approaching season. It seems that most of the folks want to make a full assault on SS this year. Ahhh, another contest in which NCCC knows how to set and keep records. You can be sure that we'll fully discuss this topic in future JUGs!

July Contests

Long periods of daylight, hot outdoor temperatures, high noise, and shallow gray lines set the stage for one of my favorite contests—the IARU HF World Championship—the one we used for our extremely successful WRTC '96 effort. It's only 24 hours long, you pick your favorite mode, no limited power categories, no messing with off-times, and you are still conscious after it is over. For us, it's sunrise to sunrise—hope to hear you on! Other contests of interest include the CQ WW VHF and the Pacific 160m test. July offers a smorgasbord to satisfy all.

The solar flux index is over 200 as this is written, and the running-average flux is still rising. Contesting has never been better. Get on the air and KB!

NEW BLOOD

For at least 30 years, one of my passions has been perpetuating the traditions of ham radio and, more specifically encouraging new contesters. I've written about it in the NCJ countless times. My NCJ series "Where are they Now?" is designed to help us understand what motivates contesters, what keeps them interested and what makes them drop out.

For seven years, K5MA, K7BV, K5KG and I ran the Houston Ham Convention (including the 1933 ARRL National) with an almost singular goal of exposing the public to ham radio and exposing as many people to contesting as possible. In fact, we were often criticized by other committee members because the DX

and contest forums were the overwhelming majority of the convention.

The Great Armadillo Run of 1996 was an integral part of the Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration. For the state, it was a novel part of the celebration. For the public it was exposure to ham radio. For those involved, it was an opportunity to run pileups from Armadillo County, TX.

A number of us introduced contesting to the hams of Nuevo Laredo, Mexico in the 70's. When we first met them, all they did was play dominoes every night and talk on 2 meters. That group is now extremely engaged in contesting and they hosted the XE national convention a number of years ago. For the XE's it was an opportunity to grow and experience new areas of ham radio. For us, it was an opportunity to set new records from XE2.

In the small town I lived in before moving from Texas, we provided communications for the MS-150 bike race. During Christmas on the Square, we set up a rig downtown and sent holiday greeting for people via ham radio. The public was exposed to ham radio and we had fun with the bikers and with the tourists.

Is the thread coming out here? I hope so. I believe the secret to overcoming "The graying of contesting" is for us to (as W4AN said) DO SOMETHING. Be a mentor for new contesters and potential hams. This is done by exposure to what we do and by sharing our passion. Enthusiasm is contagious.

Want some specifics?

- * Put on programs for your local schools. Stress the SAREX opportunities NASA is providing us with at schools.
- * Take a slide show to your local radio clubs and repeater groups. They would love to have you give a program on contesting.
- * Sponsor a contest forum at your section, division and state conventions.
- * Put up a display at your local hamfests and public flea markets.
- * Conduct Field Day in a public area. Be sure the media are informed.
- * Get involved in local events (bike races, county fairs, etc.)
- * Open your shack to non-contesters during contests.

As a management consultant, I am constantly told "I have all of these 'Generation X' employees who are not motivated and not engaged." Guess what? The answer to engaging them is sharing your passion and exposing them to your vision. Also, you must stress WII-FM (What's In It For Me?). Yep, people actually want to know what benefit behaving differently will have for them.

Instead of spending hours writing e-mails to the reflector, put a similar effort into getting off your tush and doing something! WII-FM? You will have more stations to work in every contest!

JULY MEETING

The July meeting will be the second annual joint meeting with MLDXCC on Saturday the 24th at 12 noon in Jackson, CA.

Program: N6BT, N6BV, K2KW, and N6TV will present a <u>demonstration</u> of the 6Y2A verticals and show how to use them effectively. This will be a hands on "show and tell" including a demonstration of tuning a vertical using elevated radials in real time. It is one thing to see a slide picture or read about it and quite another to have it in front of you. This is a chance to see, touch, hear and be amazed at how simple the antennas are. This is definitely a "how to" presentation including physical antennas, take off angles, planning contest expeditions, teamwork, etc. done by the guys who did it so successfully!

The meeting will be a Barbecue and potluck. Grilled chicken breasts and beef tri-tip, condiments, buns and plates/eating utensils will be provided by MLDXCC. NCCC will provide soft drinks and other non-alcoholic beverages. BYOB if you desire. Please bring the following to share based upon the first letter of the suffix of your callsign, and serving utensils if necessary:

- A G Simple desserts (cookies, fresh fruit, etc.).
- H N Chips/dips/salsa
- O U Salads (potato, macaroni, fruit, green, etc.)
- V Z Relishes (assorted pickles, olives, veggies with dip, etc.)

Talk-in on the Amador County Amateur Radio Club repeater, K6ARC, 146.835 minus 600 KHz.

In case of repeater failure, use the Stockton ARC repeater, W6SF, 147.165 plus 600 KHz.

Jackson is located at the intersection of State Highways 88 and 49 in Amador County, southeast of Sacramento.

Directions: The meeting will be held at the Senior Services Center, 229 New York Ranch Road, Jackson, CA. Take State Highways 49/88 to Jackson. From the West (State Highway 88) or North (State Highway 49), go through the traffic light at 49/88 intersection and

proceed to bottom of hill, and turn left at the 2nd stop sign (Safeway and Chevron gas station will be on your right), onto State Highway 88 East to Lake Tahoe. Follow signs to Senior Center and turn left on Court Street (approximately 1 mile). New York Ranch Road will be the first stop sign (1/4 mile). Turn right and the Senior Center will be on the left approximately 100 yards from the intersection, behind an apartment complex (signs will direct you to "Oak Manor"). **Parking** is available in both the front and back. Additional parking is available next door at the Quail Hollow Professional Center with stairs at rear that lead to the Senior Center. Please do not park in the spots marked for the Oak Manor Convalescent home.

If you want to pick up a few items on the way in, then, in addition to the Safeway mentioned above, if you continue South through the stop there is a Lucky on the right (1/4 mile) and a Raley's on the right (1 mile.)

To Jackson from the Bay Area - Take Interstate 580 East to Interstate 205 (bypass Tracy) and proceed to Interstate 5 North. Proceed North to Stockton and take State Highway 4 (Ort Lofthus Freeway) East to Highway 99 North. Proceed North for approximately 1 mile and take State Highway 88 East to Jackson.

To Jackson from Nevada - Take Interstate 80 or State Highway 50 West to State Highway 49 and proceed South to Jackson. Or take NV/CA State Highway 395 South to State Highway 88 West to Jackson and turn right on Court Street.

From the North or Sacramento - Take State Highway 16 (Jackson Road) East to State Highway 49 and proceed South to Jackson.

From the South - Take State Highway 99 North to State Highway 88 East to Jackson.

Amador County is in the heart of the Mother Lode Gold Country. Our meeting location will be minutes from antique shops galore, 18 wineries, gold mine tours, camping and fishing sites, and the historic Chaw'se Indian Grinding Rock State Park. Motels/hotels and B&B's are close by if anyone wants to make a weekend of it.
